

France. His Manifesto is dated on the 1st of May. It is an important and all-piercing paper. It adverts to the happy days of France under the Bourbon Dynasty, relates the sanguinary measures of the Revolutionary faction, recounts the fraud, deceit, perfidy and oppressions of Bonaparte, and mentions the glorious emancipation of Europe achieved by the united efforts of the allied powers. It declares that the attention of Bonaparte to the throne of France disappoints the joyful expectations justly excited by that great event, that the powers of Europe cannot confide in any promises which Napoleon may make or permit him again to possess the means to disturb the peace of the world and bring upon mankind the innumerable calamities, which heretofore he has compelled them to suffer. This measure evinces promptitude and energy hardly to have been expected from the Spanish Monarch.

Lord Wellington before his departure from Brussels, gave a splendid ball. His grace has become very popular with the Allies.

The French forces are divided into ten corps. Great numbers of French officers and soldiers, have deserted and gone over to the allies, they carried with them their arms and equipments and in some instances, cannon. By late accounts desertions increase. All possible exertions are making in France to recruit the armies, but the conscription is not very availing; the young men refuse to go.

The passage of the allied troops with hundreds of ammunition waggons and numerous batteries of Artillery, to the Rhine, continues with great activity.

The Landstrum (Militia) is organizing in all the North of Germany.

The little territory of Waldeck has 11000 men armed and equipped.

225,000 Russians with 76,000 horses are proceeding from the banks of the Vistula to the Rhine, in three columns under the command of Gen. Barclay De Tolly.

Letters from Stockholm state that Sweden has judged the measures adopted by the allies to be necessary.

10,000 Portuguese troops are, it is stated, to be sent to Ostend to join Lord Wellington's army. They have been organized by Marshal Beresford.

A part of the Austrian army of Italy has received orders to move towards France, as they are not wanted in the war against Murat.

Two Regiments of French Cavalry, deserted and joined the king at once.

The Duke of Ragusa, (Marshal Marmont) it is said will command the Spanish troops destined to act against France.

The Austrian official accounts state the defeat of Murat to have been complete and the loss great.

The affairs of Murat are represented to be in a very bad condition. He continues to retreat and is pursued by the Austrian army. A British force is said to have landed near Naples. His army is reported, to be beaten and disorganized; and his subjects disaffected and disgusted with his conduct. He has offered to retire into his own dominions and remain quiet if the Austrians will cease hostilities. This is not granted him. Lord Castlereagh in a late speech, laid before the House of Commons, the evidences of Murat's duplicity and bad faith; and proved that he had utterly failed to comply with the treaty he made with the allies.—France and Spain opposed his recognition asking of Naples at the Vienna Congress, but Britain, Russia, Austria, and Prussia would have guaranteed the kingdom of Naples to him, if he had fulfilled his engagements and had not without provocation, made war on Austria.

London May 6.

The private accounts which have accompanied the French papers obtained to Wednesday last, indicate the immediate commencement of the war. It is said that Bonaparte, three weeks since, soon after he published the circular letter to the sovereigns of Europe, was extremely apprehensive of an immediate attack, when his forces, his finances, and his means in every view were in a state of utter disorganization.—Time, we are told, has restored order in the national concerns, and it is asserted, that instead of waiting for the attack of the allies, which was understood to have been appointed for the 10th May, he would anticipate their designs, and proceed against the left wing of the British line, for the purpose of cutting off the communication between the powerful forces under Marshal Blucher and the feeble Anglo German army under the Duke of Wellington.

The Austrian detailed accounts of the operations in Italy have been received in England. These state that one of Murat's columns, which he commanded in person, had advanced towards Oechio Bello; a second towards Ferrara, a third, under Pignatelli, marched upon Florence. The Austrians in the first instance fell back: Murat

advanced close to Oechio Bello, where the Austrians had thrown up a tete de pont.—He made two attacks upon it on the 8th and 9th, but was repulsed in each. He fell back upon Carpi; thither Marshal Bianchi followed, and attacked him on the 11th. The conflict was long and bloody, but at length Murat was driven out of the place with the loss of 12 officers and 500 men. Reggio was next abandoned, and they took the route to Modena. The column which proceeded against Ferrara had begun operations against it, when on the 12th the Austrian general Mohr and Niepping attacked it, drove it off the field, destroyed its works, and pursued it as far as Bologna. The third column, under Pignatelli, had entered Florence. Gen. Nugent, retired towards Pistoja; there Pignatelli attacked him, but failed, and was driven under the walls of Florence. Two more attacks were made on him on the 10th and 11th, but the Napolitans were each time repulsed with considerable loss in killed and wounded.

On the 25th of April Gen. La Fayette partook of a public dinner with the American Ministers in Paris.
