# Rules & Regulations,

Relative to the MARKET stablished in the town of Kingston. ARTICLE I.

THAT the square between St. George's Church and the river, in the town of Kingfton, shall be the Market place, where all butchers meat, butter, eggs, poultry, fish and vegetables, shall be exposed to sale.

2. That every day in the year shall be a market day, except Christmas, Good Friday and Sundays.

3 That no person shall sell butcher's meat, butter, eggs, poultry, fish or vegetables, from the hour of fix in the morning till the hour of four in the afternmoon, except in the market, under the penalty of five shillings.

4. That no person shall kill calves or other animals in the market place, or gut fish, or empty bellies or guts of animals therein, under the penaly of five shillings.

5. That no perfor shall expose for sale any tainted meat or fift, in the market place, under the penalty of five shillings, besides forfeiture of the same, on view of one justice.

6. That no person shall expose fish for fale within the two floored squares of the market house, but they may be exposed for fale in the intermediate space, upon boards or ben-

7. Whereas there is room for eight butchers stalls or benches in the market house ;fuch part of the same as is not already occupied shall be assigned by lot to the several burchers defirous of occupying the fame, and the occupier shall immediately erect shalls or beaches not exceeding ten feet long and feven feet wide, which shall be uniform.

8. Whereas persons from the country may require moveable benches or stails - the same shall not exceed seven feet in length and three feet in breadth; any person placing a moveable bench of greater dimensions in the market house, and neglecting to remove the fame immediately after the market is over, shall pay a fine of five shillings and the laid bench may be demolished by order of the clerk of the market.

9. Every person selling by false weights, shall pay a fine of twenty shitlings, and the faid weights shall be dellroyed.

10. All persons selling riovitions of other articles by weight in the market, shall provide themselves with good scales & weights. regularly stamped [within three months from this date, after which if any person shall there weigh with seelyards or weights not samped) fuch person shall pay a fine of tell shillings.

It: Whereas it is expedient to appoint fome person to see the aforesaid rules and regulations, or any other that may be hereafter made relative to the market carried into effect : James Adams, of the town of King-Iton is hereby appointed clerk of the market,

12. It shall be the duty of the clerk of the market to attend to enforce the execution of all regulations which respect the market, under the penalty of twenty shillings for every wilful neglect.

13. He shall keep a list of the persone occupying fixed or moveable stalls or benches which he shall be ready to render to the magiffrates whenever they may demand it.

14. When the market house requires repair, or should any person damage the same he shall immediately make it known to the magistrates or some one of them.

15. He shall see that butcher's and others occupying the market house, do leave no filth therein, and keep the fame clean.

i6. He shall from time to time examine and fee that all weights and measures made use of in the market place are just.

17. The clerk of the market shall be aflowed the following fees:

By every butcher occupying a fixed bench or flail, to be paid quarterly and in advance twelve shillings per annum;

By every person keeping a moveable bench or stall for selling butchers meat, twelve shillings per annum, or nine pence each market day, at the option of such person.

From every person occupying a place for felling fish, fix pence per day.

18. And the clerk thall fix a table of the above fees in some conspicious place in the market house.
