To perfons of every description he displayed the utmost complassance, and absolutely stole the affections of all who knew him. Six months we had the pleafure of his fociety, and he has left to many agreeable impresfions, and has done here to many acts of kindness, that his name will very long and very dearly be remembered amongst us .-Here he was well received; here every rice of hospitality was shown to him, and every exertion made to beguile him into an oblivion of his misfortunes. Delightful indeed is the recellection of those services, especially when it is confidered that they were paid to one, on whose grateful heart no generofity was loft; and that they had the happy effect of footbing the last days of an unfortunate firanger and captive, an upright man, a kind and faithful friend, a most affectionate relation, and a BELOVED PHYSICIAN.

Erie, Pa. June 7.

A channel has been formed by the rife of the lake across the upper end of the Peninsula. There is little doubt but in a short time it will be of sufficient depth to admit of large vessels passing through.

There has been various caufes assigned for the extraordinary rife of the lake; none of them facisfactory. Without venturing to give an opinion, we will frate a few facts that may be relied on, and may assist others in their refearches. The lake every year rifes from about the middle of April until the middle of July, with fome variation, and fails in autumn. From 1795, until 1801, it remained about statu quo, excepting the annual rife and fall just mentioned. From 1801 until 1811, it fell about a foot; it was then lower than it had over been known, by the oldest settlers. Since then it has rifen about four feet. There are no visible marks of its ever having been higher than at present.
