AMHERSTBURGH, FORT GEORGE, TORK, KIN -STON, FORT WELLINGTON.

All persons therefore who may have claims for damages faid to have been done by our own

troops: For lamages done by the enemy: For houses and buildings occupied as barracks, or for other publie purposes, said to have been destroyed by the enemy in con sequence of that ircumstance---Are hereby directed to deliver feparate accounts of the same, duly authenticated, and coffici under the before mentioned heads, to the officer commanding His Niajesty's troops at either or the above polls, on or before the 30th 3cptember, after which day no chains whatfoever of the nature above described, will be received or takin into confideration.

GLNERAL ORDERS.

MILITARY SECRETARY'S OFFICE, KINGSTON, 1716 JULY, 1815. oral Order of the General Order of the 6th December 1814, communicating the gracious intentions of his Royal Highness the Poince Regent, of granting to desbanded Soldiers, locations of Wiste Lands and Crown Referves in the Canadas— The Excellency Major Goveral Sir frederick Robinson, ommanding in the Province of U. per Canada, directother at ... manne oliowing res mation and guidance of fuch claims ants, who may be desirous of fetthing in the faid Province.

EACH Soldier is to be allowed One Hundred Acres of Land, and si to receive his location from the Superintendant, upon his being fatisfied that the claimant is of the description, and of the character, to become an useful seitler. He is to be placed on his land; the boundaries of which, and the condivious of his grant, are to be expressed in the ticket of location. It is to be clearly under flood, that the lands held under these grants, cannot be alienated or disposed of until the grantee shall have resided upón and cultivated a reasonable proportion of the fame, for the space of three years.

Officers will be entitled to a ticket of location in the first instance, for two hundred acres of land, upon condition that they cause a reasonable proportion of the same to be cultivated, and do not dispose of it until three years after the date of the ticket.

Officers and Men are to receive provisions for themselves and families, in fuch proportions as shall be hereafter specified, for one year.

IMPLEMENTS of husbandry and tools, will also be supplied to them in sufficient quantities, and other comforts according to the necessities of the individuals.

WITH a view to carry buo full effect the intentions of his Majefty's Government on this head, his Excellency has been pleased to appoint

ALEXANDER M'DONELL, Esq. To be Superinter dant.

His Excellency has also been pleafed to appoint Lieut. ANGUS M'DONELL, of the Glengary Light Infantry Fenci des, with the pay of 2s 6d army ftc ing per day, in addition to the full pay of his commission in the army, to be stationed at the depot at Cornwall, to receive and take charge of the fettlers. This appointment to take place from the 25th whimo, and to continue until ? ? ier orders.

LIEUT. M'Donell will proceed immediately to Cornwall, and place himself under the orders of the fuperintendant.

ALL applications on the part of claimants for lands in Upper Canada, are to be made until further notice, to the officer in charge of the depot at Cornwall.

PASSAGES to the depot will be ordered, on application at the office of the Quarter Master General for fuch of these men (and their families) as may have received their discharges in the Upper Province.
