FROM THE MONTREAL HERALD.

A LETTER.—I.

Mr. Editor,

SIR—It is the fate of all new settlements, to labour under many disadvantages, not only till they clear land, build houses, make roads; but likewise till they get other institutions brought to some order and utility. Among such institutions as they want, the education of children ought to have the first place. But that the plan of education has improved in these Provinces commensurate to their prosperity, or that it is conducted in the best manner, is what I will not affirm. The few schools that have respectable and able teachers are not here to be considered. The following observations are entirely confined to our common country schools, without any reference to those schools, that are under the superintendance of experienced and well educated teachers.— All men, in every civilized country, wish to give some learning to their children, but only a few are capable of judging how it should be accomplished. The only question which is generally deemed necessary to be canvassed is, how to hire a person, calling himself a school master, for as little money as possible. Engaging for low wages is the best qualification that a man can have, the best recommendation he can bring in his favor.— When a person is thus found willing to work cheap, and to undertake the tuition of children for the pittance that fordid parsimony is willing to afford, business will smoothly go on, till one or more of the employers quarrel with the matter, then an immediate dismissal is the result. Hence, a country schoolmaster is an insignificant contemptible being, a mere cypher in society. No man of any talents and respectability of character will ever undertake the office for want of encouragement; nor is any such wanted unless his demands be on a level with those of the persons that have always been employed. Men usually hire the best workmen they can get, for any other work, business or employment; but the cheapest matter to instruct their children, let his qualifications and morals be what they will. Our schoolmasters, are, therefore, composed of untalented boys; or of dunces that are unfit for business and too lazy to live by the "sweat of their face." No wonder then that the profession is reduced to the utmost contempt. The truth of this remark is so sensibly felt, that though many are willing to educate their sons for commercial business, no man has ever, within the sphere of my acquaintance, educated his son, unless he were a dunce and consequently good for nothing else, to be a schoolmaster. If you will print these remarks Mr. Editor I shall send you more on the same subject.

From the Canadian Courant.

MR. MOWER,—As public apprehension has been lately excited by several dreadful cases of Hydrophobia, which have occurred in the Province, I beg leave to communicate a Preventive, discovered not long since in Poland and which passes for infallible.

The inventor of this mode of treatment is Dr. Demoneta, Physician in ordinary to the late King.

He directs that the wound be covered with fresh earth or with snuff, in order to imbibe the saliva of the animal—and then to wash it with water. When the wound is thus cleaned, he orders that half a pound of butter be melted in four times the quantity of vinegar, and that a compress of linen be steeped in this mixture and often applied to the wound for nine days—after which it may be discontinued.

Besides this topical application, he directs that an ounce and a half of vinegar, warmed with a little fresh butter, be taken internally four times a day—drinking from time to time vinegar and water, as a common beverage.—A rigid diet is also insisted on, as well as a total abstinence from all spirituous liquors.

This happy method of treatment has enabled Dr. Demoneta to prevent Hydrophobia in more than sixty persons.

Other Practitioners have tried it with success—which renders it well worthy of a trial in the first new case that occurs in Canada. S. C. B. Boucherville, July 5, 1815.
