### COMMUNICATIONS.

Latet anguis in herba.

MR. MILES,

I was much amused on reading a paragraph under the signature of a "True Briton," inserted in your last Gazette, which particularly attracted my attention by the singular contradiction there exists between the sentiments and the assumed name of the writer.

After making a few desultory observations on the prices of provisions in our market since the return of peace, he proceeds to attack the proprietors of the Steam Boat in a manner, which reflects no great honor, either on his candour, or his generosity. He gives us to understand that these gentlemen have sent a Petition to our Provincial Legislature, praying for a right to navigate the waters between Prescott and Queenston to the utter exclusion of all other Vessels. Now, sir, as I have had an opportunity of perusing this petition, I deem it expedient, in order to do away the false impressions which this person may have made on the minds of the public, to declare, that the circumstance alluded to is very much misrepresented.—The proprietors of the Steam Boat are men of too much discernment, to make a request so preposterous and absurd. The petition they presented to Parliament was for the right of navigating by means of steam the waters of this Province between Prescott and Queenston, to the exclusion of all other Steam Boats, especially of the American, for a limited time; and in this request, it will be observed that they had reason on their side, for if we take into consideration the novelty of the undertaking in this Province, the capital requisite to carry the project into execution, the spirit of adventurous enterprise manifested, and above all the advantage which the public in general will receive from it in the event of its success, we must assuredly admit that they merit some privileges. The spirit of commercial enterprise has slumbered among us too long already, and a refusal on the part of our Legislature to grant the right abovementioned for a short period, would have a most pernicious effect: it would nip in the bud a flower, which it is the duty of every government to cherish with all its means.

The "True Briton," after this strong attack against the proprietors of the Steam Boat, goes on to recommend the policy of continuing to allow the same advantages to the Americans, which they at present enjoy in the intercourse with this Province, not merely so far as regards the importation of provision; but also of every species of American manufacture.

It appears to be with him a matter of trifling importance, what restrictions are laid by the government of the United States on the introduction of British manufactures into their territories, or in what manner may be affected the prosperity of our own farmers, who compose the majority of our population, and whose interests are surely worthy of notice. These matters are of no weight with him, as his views are wholly directed to the opposite side of the subject, respecting which he speaks most feelingly, and we may therefore infer that he has some more important object to gain by the continuance of the intercourse with our neighbours on its present footing, than the mere reduction in the prices of produce in our market, and that he may with the greatest degree of justice, be styled patriotic, since he manifests such real concern for the welfare and prosperity of his countrymen.

Another very entertaining circumstance is the artifice he has used to conceal his real views, by pleading in the most pathetic manner, the cause of the warriors who fought in our defence during the late unnatural war as he terms it, and for this service he merits their acknowledgements; but this disguise is insufficient, as we may easily perceive, that although he styles himself a True Briton, he is nothing but an ass—cloathed in the skin of the lion.
