I shall transmit your address to His Majesty's Minister, in order that this expection of your approbation of my post diministration, may be laid at the feet of His Royal Highnors the Prince Regent. Government Heist.

York. 26th March, 1816.

This day, at four o'Clock, His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, proceeded in Mate from the Government House, accompanied by the commanding Officer of the District and staff at this Post, and attended by the principal officers of Government, to the Legislative Council Chamber, where, with the accustomed formalities, being feated on the Throne, and the House of affembly having come up to the Bar, His Excellency was pleased to assent, in His Majesty's name, to feveral Bills.

The Honorable the speaker of the House of affembly, on presenting the Bill, Granting a sum of Money to His Majesty, delivered the following speech at the Bar :-

May it please your Excellency. His Majesty's faithful Commons, with the concurrence of the Legislative Council, in behalf of the people of Upper Canada, recoveving from the miseries of war. fervently offer to their fovereign, and to the powerful nation which afforded them its protection in the hour of their difficulty and danger, their humble and grateful acknowledgments.

The fignal benefits as a Colony of the United Kingdom of G eat Britain & Ireland we have experienced, and continue to enjoy, make us defirous of manifesting to His Majesty, the high fense entertained of his constant tenderness and Paternal care-and to the nation which has nurtured us from our Infancy, our Gratitude for the support we bave received .- We therefore by the bill I now present to your Excellency, give and Grant to His Majesty, his heirs and succesfors, in aid of the civil List of this Province, the fam of Two THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED Pounds annually, out of the Revenue thereof-This sum, your Excellency is entreated to accept. in the name and behalf of his Majesty, as a small tribute from humble acd limited means-Impressed with se timents of unbounded and affectionate Levalty to our venerable and beloved Sovereign, We, with all humility, Pray Your Excellency to affent

to the bill, in his Majesty's Name Upon which the sceretary of the Prov-

ince faid, his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor thanks, in his Majesty's Name, his Majesty's Loyal subjects-accepts their benevolence-and affents to this bill.

His Excellency was then pleased to close the seifton, with the following gracious Speech :-

Hon. Gentlemen of the Legislative Conneil, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

The Public butiness of the Province having been brought to a close, by your long & laborious application, I now come to relieve you from your present attendance, and at the fame time to thank you for the zealous difcharge of your Legislative functions, in providing fo many valuable laws, which must be attended with the most falutary effects to this Province.

That particularly which provides for the Diffemination of letters in this infant colony, must secure to you the gratitude and Veneration of the riling and future generations.

The Wildom of your determination to leave the regulation of the commercial duties and drawbacks, to his majesty's Executive Government of this Province, until the Imperial Parliament decides upon them, cannot be called in question.

Gentlemen of the House of Affembly.

I thank you for the liberal provision you have made for the attainment of very interceting objects; for the remoneration of very valuable fervices: and effecially for the annual supply, in aid of the civil list, which, I trust, will be so dispused of as to justify your liberality and confidence.

Hon Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

Your return to your feveral Districts at this feason, must be of great public advantage, by affording your prefence at the approaching sessions of the Peace.

I need not recommend to you, fo to employ the influence of your example, as to confirm the spirit of loyalty, and love of country, amongst your neighbours and constituents, and fatirfy them, that his majesty's Paternai Government has no object, but their fafety honor and happinels!

In the chamber of Deputies the subject is about to be taken up as a State question of considerable importance: we apprehend, therefore, that in the opinion of some Depnties suspicion attraches in some degree to the King's Ministers. Nothing has been . heard of Lavallette fince; but one of his jailors is in custody on suspicion of aiding him in his escape. In the case of the Earl of Nithidale, one of the condemned Lords for the rebellion of 1715, his escape was effected in women's clothes it is true; but not in those of his Lady, as has been erroneoully stated. The Dowager Countels of Nithsdale, his mother, furnished her son with a fuit of her apparel, and the family likeness being very striking, his keepers were the more eafy deceived.

BRUSSELS PAPERS.

Bruffels Jan 23 .- According to private letters from Paris Mr. Bruce, on his first examination upon the escape of Lavalette, answered in the following manner to the questi-

one which were put to him:-Q Your name? -A. There is nobody except the Police of Paris to whom my name is not known.

Q. Of what country are you ?-A. Of that country which has conquered France.

Q Did you affift in the escape of Lavalette?-A. Distinguish : if you mean his escape from prison, no-if you mean his escape from the kingdom of France, yes .- I might fay no to this a fo. but I fay yes.

Q. What were your motives for acting in

this manner? - A. My motives -- IR, inerder to fave a perfecuted idividual; 2d, to ferve humanity; 3d, to answer the appeal made to English honour (loyaute Anglaise.) am appeal which is never made in vain. Lavalette entered my apartment, he faid to me, 62 I am Lavalette; I have just escaped from prison; I am puissed; I see some Gendarmes at the head of the street; I dare not proceed for fear of being again arrested; I fly to you; I confide myfelf to English honour (loyaute) fave me."-Then I took off my uniform, which I made Lavalette out on ; afterwards I concerted with my friends upon what was to be done to convey him out of the kingdom; I refolved to accomplish it myself, and I conveyed Lavalette out of France in my own carriage. This enterprize fucceeded by means of the difguife, &c.
