To His Royal Highness GEORGE PRINCE OF WALES, PRINCE REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, &c. &c.

May it please Your Royal Highness!

We His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada in Provincial Parliament assembled, impressed with a lively sense of the firm, upright and liberal administration of FRANCIS GORE, Esq. Lieutenant Governor of this Province, as well as of his unceasing attention to the individual and general interests of the colony during his absence, have unanimously passed a Bill to appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Pounds to enable him to Purchase a service of Plate, commemorative of Our Gratitude.

Apprized that this spontaneous Gift cannot receive the sanction of our beloved Sovereign in the ordinary mode, by the acceptance of the Lieutenant Governor in his Name and behalf. We the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada humbly beg leave to approach Your Royal Highness with an earnest Prayer that you will approve this demonstration of our Gratitude, and graciously be pleased to sanction in His Majesty's Name the Grant of the Legislature in behalf of the Inhabitants of Upper Canada.

To which His Excellency Replied:  
Gentlemen!

I shall transmit your address to His Majesty's Minister, in order that this expression of your approbation of my past administration, may be laid at the feet of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent.

Government House,  
York, 26th March, 1816.

This day, at four o'clock, His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, proceeded in state from the Government House, accompanied by the commanding Officer of the District and staff at this Post, and attended by the principal officers of Government, to the Legislative Council Chamber, where, with the accustomed formalities, being seated on the Throne, and the House of Assembly having come up to the Bar, His Excellency was pleased to assent, in His Majesty's name, to several Bills.

The Honorable the speaker of the House of Assembly, on presenting the Bill, Granting a sum of Money to His Majesty, delivered the following speech at the Bar:—

May it please your Excellency.

His Majesty's faithful Commons, with the concurrence of the Legislative Council, in behalf of the people of Upper Canada, recovering from the miseries of war, fervently offer to their sovereign, and to the powerful nation which afforded them its protection in the hour of their difficulty and danger, their humble and grateful acknowledgments.

The signal benefits as a Colony of the United Kingdom of Great Britain & Ireland we have experienced, and continue to enjoy, make us desirous of manifesting to His Majesty, the high sense entertained of his constant tenderness and paternal care—and to the nation which has nurtured us from our Infancy, our Gratitude for the support we have received.—We therefore by the bill I now present to your Excellency, give and Grant to His Majesty, his heirs and successors, in aid of the civil List of this Province, the sum of Two THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS annually, out of the Revenue thereof.—This sum, your Excellency is entreated to accept, in the name and behalf of his Majesty, as a small tribute from humble and limited means.—Impressed with sentiments of unbounded and affectionate Loyalty to our venerable and beloved Sovereign, We, with all humility, Pray Your Excellency to assent to the bill, in His Majesty's Name

Upon which the secretary of the Prov-

ince said, his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor thanks, in His Majesty's Name, his Majesty's Loyal Subjects—accepts their benevolence—and assents to this bill.

His Excellency was then pleased to close the session, with the following gracious Speech:—

Hon. Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

The Public business of the Province having been brought to a close, by your long & laborious application, I now come to relieve you from your present attendance, and at the same time to thank you for the zealous discharge of your Legislative functions, in providing for many valuable laws, which must be attended with the most salutary effects to this Province.

That particularly which provides for the Diffusion of letters in this infant colony, most secure to you the gratitude and Veneration of the rising and future generations.

The Wisdom of your determination to leave the regulation of the commercial duties and drawbacks, to his Majesty's Executive Government of this Province, until the Imperial Parliament decides upon them, cannot be called in question.

Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

I thank you for the liberal provision you have made for the attainment of very interesting objects; for the remuneration of very valuable services; and especially for the annual supply, in aid of the civil list, which, I trust, will be so disposed of as to justify your liberality and confidence.

Hon. Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

Your return to your several Districts at this season, must be of great public advantage, by affording your presence at the approaching sessions of the Peace.

I need not recommend to you, so to employ the influence of your example, as to confirm the spirit of loyalty, and love of country, amongst your neighbours and constituents, and satisfy them, that his Majesty's Paternal Government has no object, but their safety honor and happiness!

After which the honourable the speaker of the legislative council signified that it was the pleasure of his Excellency the Lieut. Governor that the present Parliament be prorogued to the second day of May next ensuing, to be then here holden, which was prorogued accordingly.

LONDON, JANUARY 11.

The sudden arrival of Sir Harry Calvert from the country on the death of Sir George Prevost, has revived the belief that the adjutant General of the Forces will succeed to the important command in Canada, one of the most lucrative appointments in the army.

The reduction of Cavalry regiments we hear is to be confined to one, the 25th Light Dragoons, which is to be ordered home from the East Indies for that purpose.

December 20.

There having been a heavy fall of snow in many parts of the country, particularly in Lancaster, and in all the roads leading to Manchester, it is from 11 to 14 inches deep; so that travelling has been considerably impeded, and the mails from every road into town were on Monday last nearly two hours after their usual time of arrival.

The Duke of Norfolk died with a complaint in the liver.

To day we received the Paris papers of Friday and Saturday. They are chiefly filled with details respecting Lavalette's escape. In the chamber of Deputies the subject is about to be taken up as a State question of considerable importance: we apprehend, therefore, that in the opinion of some Deputies suspicion attaches in some degree to the King's Ministers. Nothing has been heard of Lavalette since; but one of his jailors is in custody on suspicion of aiding him in his escape. In the case of the Earl of Nithsdale, one of the condemned Lords for the rebellion of 1715, his escape was effected in women's clothes it is true; but not in those of his Lady, as has been erroneously stated. The Dowager Countess of Nithsdale, his mother, furnished her son with a suit of her apparel, and the family likewise being very striking, his keepers were the more easily deceived.

BRUSSELS PAPERS.

Brussels Jan. 23.—According to private letters from Paris Mr. Bruce, on his first examination upon the escape of Lavalette, answered in the following manner to the questions which were put to him:—

Q Your name?—A. There is nobody except the Police of Paris to whom my name is not known.

Q Of what country are you?—A. Of that country which has conquered France.

Q Did you assist in the escape of Lavalette?—A. Distinguish: if you mean his escape from prison, no—if you mean his escape from the kingdom of France, yes.—I might say no to this also, but I say yes.

Q What were your motives for acting in

this manner?—A. My motives—1st, in order to save a persecuted individual; 2d, to serve humanity; 3d, to answer the appeal made to English honour (loyaute Anglaise.) an appeal which is never made in vain. Lavalette entered my apartment, he said to me, "I am Lavalette; I have just escaped from prison; I am pursued; I see some Gendarmes at the head of the street; I dare not proceed for fear of being again arrested; I fly to you; I confide myself to English honour (loyaute) save me."—Then I took off my uniform, which I made Lavalette put on; afterwards I concerted with my friends upon what was to be done to convey him out of the kingdom; I resolved to accomplish it myself, and I conveyed Lavalette out of France in my own carriage. This enterprise succeeded by means of the disguise, &c.
