

London March 27.

We received this morning the Paris papers of Sunday last. They contain a message from the King to both Chambers, announcing the intended marriage of the Duke de Berri to the grand daughter of the King of the two Sicilies.

Latest from France.

Extract is a Gentleman in Baltimore, dated, Bordeaux, March 19.

Your officers and some sailors belonging to the American Squadron, at Mahon, were sent there lately in an affray with the Spanish soldiers. Commodore Shaw demanded that exemplary punishment should immediately be inflicted on the soldiers, as they were the aggressors, and then with his Squadron left the port, without waiting the reply of the Spanish government to his demands."

CHAMBER of DEPUTIES.

Sitting of March 23

M. de Corbieres, Reporter of the committee on the Budget, made a rapid recapitulation of the debates relative to the arrears, and announced that the committee adhered to its opinion of not alienating the forests.

Count Corvetto, Minister of France, stated, that the King had caused a correct account of the different propositions debated in the Assembly to be laid before him, and had thereupon given orders, in consequence of which a new project was now submitted to the chamber.

The new project being read, a debate arose on some of the articles, in course of which M. Corbieres defended the opinion of the committee.

This debate was interrupted by the arrival of the Duke of Richelieu with a message from the King.

The Duke addressing the Chamber, said, the King has charged me to communicate an event equally happy for the State and his own family, and from which he experiences a satisfaction in which you will share. The Duke of Berri is immediately to marry the Princess Caroline of the Two Sicilies, like himself a descendant of Louis XVI, and the same time, of Maria Theresia, who was illustrious among illustrious women, and great among great Kings. The Minister concluded his speech by presenting a law project, granting, in consequence of this union, a million of francs annually. The 24th article of the project directs that the grant shall be reduced during five years to 500,000 francs, at the end of which period it shall be paid in full. [On reading this article the Minister was interrupted by loud acclamation against any reduction.]

When the reading of the message was completed, the whole assembly rose spontaneously and cried—Vive le Roi—Vivent les Bourbons.

The Duke of Richelieu communicated the King's ordinance regulating the firms in which the births, deaths, and marriages of the royal family are to be kept.

LONDON, APRIL 1.

The Prince of Coburg is to be created Duke of Kendal, by which creation her Royal Highness the Princess Charlotte of Wales, Heiress presumptive to the throne, will become Duchess of Kendal, a title only known in this country by having been borne by the German Princesses of George I.

The Brevet Commission of Major has been given by the British to the Indian Chief, Norton. He is the son of a Scotclaman.

A self-acting Pump for leaky ships has been invented in England. It acts best when the sea is most tempestuous.

Several individuals have died lately in Ireland of a malignant disorder in a house in which a trunk of clothes from the Mediterranean had been opened.

Patent Prescriptions are prepared in England—Fresh provisions are put in canisters and so preserved, that they have been known to keep sweet and good for two years. A great number of certificates in their favor from respectable persons are given. Preserved milk is also in repute for voyages.

We have conversed with a gentleman who left England on the 3d of last month. He has convinced us that there is an "extensive enterprise" on foot, at the head of which is the Emperor of Russia. A few weeks will develop the present conjectures.

Among the wounded survivors of the Iniskilling dragoons now in Exeter, there is a serjeant who received in the battle of Waterloo, 13 sabre wounds in the body, a musket ball passed through his thigh, and both his arms were broken. In this state he lay on the field of battle (amidst a heap of slain) from Sunday to Tuesday evening following, when the persons employed to bury the dead observing some signs of life in him, he was conveyed to an hospital and recovered.

HOUSE OF LORDS, MARCH 26.

The Duke of Suffolk said he had a Petition to present to the House, from the Corporation

of the City of London, against the immense standing army and praying for retrenchment. He had understood that one of the great benefits which was expected to result from the peace, was to be a reduction of the immense standing force. He would only repeat then what he had formerly stated, that there was the greatest necessity for watching over the whole of the proposed establishment. If remains proposed to be kept up, were employed in the room of so many soldiers of the line, saving to the country would be at least 6,000 a year. The Petition was then read, and ordered to be laid on the table.

A Bill was introduced last night, and the usual forms being dispensed with, passed both houses of Parliament, for naturalizing Prince Leopold of Saxe Cobourg. The ceremonial of the marriage between his Highness and the Princess Charlotte, will be solemnized at Carlton House by the Archbishop of Canterbury, on Tuesday evening, the 16th of April next.

Downing Street, January 29, 1816.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to appoint Lieutenant General Sir JOHN COAPE SHERERBROOKE, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, to be Captain General and Governor in Chief of the Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and the Islands of Prince Edward, and Cape Breton.

Extraordinary escape.—On Sunday evening week, Mr. J. H. Inman, a farmer of Penryn, Cornwall, was returning from a place of worship across a common to his own house, a heavy mist falling he mistook his way and fell into an exposed shaft of a mine, 96 feet deep besides nine feet of water in the bottom; and almost miraculously, he reached the water without receiving any serious injury. Being an expert swimmer he kept himself afloat during the night; occasionally relieving himself, by clinging to the projecting points of rock in the side of the shaft. The return of daylight on Monday, enabled him to seek a kind of ledge, on which he contrived to get, and on which he lay the whole of Monday, calling for assistance; but no person approached the place, and Monday night came on whilst he continued in his perilous situation, when, overcome by fatigue, he fell asleep, and again fell into the water. The darkness of the night prevented his regaining his resting place, and he had to support himself as before, until Tuesday morning, when he regained the spot from which he fell. He had now become quite hoarse from cold, and almost incessant calling for help, so that the only resource he had for drawing the attention of those whom he supposed, would be sent to seek for him, was by throwing stones into the water.—Tuesday night came without affording him any relief; but the terror of again falling into the water effectually prevented his sleeping. On Wednesday, however, the noise made by the stones which he continued to throw into the water attracted the attention of some persons whom his distressed family had dispatched in search of his remains, and he was extricated from the dreadful abyss without sustaining any serious contusion.

A PROCLAMATION.

By the President of the U. States.

Whereas by the act entitled "An act granting bounties in land and extra pay to certain Canadian Volunteers," passed the 5th of March, 1816, it was enacted that the locations of the land warrants of the said volunteers should "be subject to such regulations, as to priority of choice, and the manner of location, as the President of U. States shall direct."

Wherefore, I JAMES MADISON, President of the United States, in conformity with the provisions of the act before recited, do hereby make known that the land warrants of the said Canadian Volunteers may be located, agreeably to the said act at the Land Offices at Vincennes, or Jeffersonville, in the Indiana territory, on the first Monday in June next, with the Registers of the said Land Offices; that the warrantees may, in person, or by their attorneys, or other legal representatives, in the presence of the register and receiver of the said land districts, draw lots for the priority of location, and that, should any of the warrants not appear for location on that day, they may be located afterwards, according to their priority of presentation: the locations in the district of Vincennes to be made at Vincennes, and the locations in the district of Jeffersonville to be made at Jeffersonville.

Baltimore, May 2. By the brig Peter, we learn that the British fleet consisting of one three decker, two 74's and several frigates, under Ad. Lord Exmouth, sailed from Leghorn, 4th March, destination unknown, but reported were commissioned to fulfil certain requirements of the Allied Powers, relative to the Barbary States, as far as regards their mode of warfare, which the Allies have determined shall be waged and carried on according to the custom and manners of the most civilized nations, viz making no slaves of prisoners &c.

New-York, May 7.

The notorious pirate captured.—We this morning received the following pleasing information from our Philadelphia correspondent:—

"The U. S. brig Boxer, Capt. Elkton, has arrived at Havana, from a cruise, after capturing the Carthaginian schooner Melor, commanded by the notorious pirate Mitchell. Eighty thousand dollars in specie, and other valuable plunder, was removed on board the Boxer, and the prize manned and sent to N. Orleans for adjudication."

There was a distressing fire at St. Johns, Newfoundland, on the night of the 12th February last. The aggregate pecuniary loss has been moderately estimated at upwards of £100,000; about 1500 persons have been driven to seek new abodes in the most inclement month of a Newfoundland winter.

MONTREAL, MAY 11, 1816.

On the evening of the 25th April, a most daring robbery was committed in the dwelling house of Mr. James P. L., at Brockville, Upper Canada. The villains succeeded in breaking the iron chest, and carried away 475 half eagles, 107 doubloons, 250 dollars in small change, and 80 dollars in 3s bank tokens. The persons suspected are David Lewis, an American, Guy Lewis, an American, a fellow called Chapman, alias Seaman) and another by the name of Fox, together with others residing in the county. Mr. Hall has offered a reward of 1500 dollars, to any person or persons who shall restore the money, and bring the robbers to punishment.

We understand, Major General Sir FREDERICK ROBINSON, late administrator of the Government of Upper Canada, has been appointed Governor of the Island of Tobago.
