The Dake of Berri is immediately to marry the Pringels Caroline of the Two Sicilies, like himfelf a descendant of Louis XVI, and the fame time, of Maria Therefa, who was illustrious among illustrious women, and great among great Kings. The Minister concluded his speech by presenting a law project, granting, in confequence of this union, a million of francs annually. The 24th article of the project directs that the grant shall be reduced during five years to 500,000 francs, at the end of which period it shall be paid in full. Extraordinary escaps. - On Sunday evening week, Mr. J H. Iman. a farmer of Penran, Cornwall, was returning from a place of worthip acrofs a common to his own houle, a heavy mist falling he mistook his way and fell into an exposed shaft of a mine, 96 feet deep befides nine feet of water in the bottom; and almost miraculously, he reached the water without receiving any ferious injury. Being an expert swimmer he kept himself affoat during the night; occasionally relieving himfelf, by clinging to the projecting points of rock in the fide of the fhaft. The return of daylight on Monday, enabled him to feek a kind of ledge, on which he contrived to get, and on which he lay the whole of Monday, calling for affiffance; but no person approached the place, and Monday night came on whilf he continued in his perilous fituation, when, overcome by fatigue, he feil afleep, and again fell into the water. The darkness of the night preserted his regaining his relling place, and he had to support him felf as before, until Tuelday morning, when hie engagine i the figure former whitely live field. The had now become quit- hoasfe from cold, and zimost inceffant cailing for help, fo that the only refource he had for drawing the atten tion of the fe whom, he supposed, would be fent to feek for him, was by throwing theres into the water. - Tuelday night came without affording him any relief; but the terror of again falling into the water effectually prevented his fleening. On Wednefday, however, the noise made by the stones which be continued to throw into the water attracted the attention of some persons whom his diffressed family had dispatched in search of his remains, and he was extricated from the dreading abyse without fustaining any serious contulion.

A PROCLAMATION.

By the President of the U. States.

Whereas by the act entitled "An act granting bounties in land and extra pay to certain Canadian Volunteers," pailed the fifth of March, 1816, it was enacted that the locations of the land warrants of the faid volunteers should " be subject to such regulations, as to priority of choice, and the manner of location, as the President of U. States shall direct :"

Wherefore, I JAMES MADISON, Prefident of the United States, in conformity with the provisions of the act before recited, do hereby make known that the land warrants of the faid Canadian Volunteers may be located, agreeably to the faid act at the Land Offices at Vincennes, or Jeffersonville, in the Indiana territory, on the first Monday in June next, with the Registers of the faid Land Offices; that the warrantees may, in person, or by ther attorneys, or other legal representatives, in the presence of the register and receiver of the faid land diffricts, draw lots for the priority of location, and that, should any of the warrants not appear for location on that day, they may be located afterwards, according to their priority of presentation: the locations in the district of Vincennes to be made at Vincennes, and the locations in the diffrict of Jeffertonville to be made at Iefferionville.

Eighty thousand dollars in specie, and other valuable plunder, was removed on board the Boxer, and the prize manned and fent to N. Orleans for adjudication."

There was a diffresting fire at St. Johns, Newfoundland, on the night of the 12th February last. The aggregate pecuniary lofs has been moderately estimated at upwards of £ 100,100; about 1500 persons have been driven to feek new abodes in the most inchement mouth of a Newfoundland winter.
