**FREDERICKSBURG (Vir.) JULY 17.**  
"In the midst of Life we are in Death."  
Died, on Saturday morning, late Mr. WILLIAM JONES, the youngest son of the late Mr. Charles Jones. The manner of his death deserves particular notice, both from the shocking circumstances attending it, and as a solemn warning to others. The deceased kept a grocery shop. Having occasion to leave his shop, on Friday, after dinner, he had closed the front door, carelessly flung the stump of a segar that he had been smoking behind him in the shop. Immediately recollecting the impropriety of the act, he turned to see where it had fallen, when, melancholy to relate, a keg of loose powder, into which the segar had fallen, exploded!—In an instant the house was blown to atoms, and the wretched author of the accident burnt and mangled in so shocking a manner, that in 12 hours after, during which he suffered inconceivable agonies, he was a lifeless
