LIVERPOOL, May 31.
Lucien Bonaparte has engaged the attention of the ministers of the allied powers; and from an official document which has been issued, it appears, that he had applied to the Austrian government for passports for himself and son, whom he wished to accompany to America; that government feeling doubts as to the propriety of giving these persons the means of quitting Europe, applied to the ministers of England, Russia, Prussia and France, assembled in Paris, who entered into resolutions to restrain Lucien and his son from going to America; and they even go further and say, that as in the territories of the Roman pontiff, a sufficient check cannot be kept upon Lucien to prevent his escape, some other place shall be assigned him for a residence: of the strict justice of such a decree, we have considerable doubts; but the intrigue of this second performance in consequence of the Bonaparte family, may have rendered both the restriction and removal politic, and perhaps absolutely necessary.

At a conference at Paris, at which were present the ministers of Austria, Russia, and Prussia, and the Duke of Richelieu, the Duke of Wellington and Sir Charles Stuart; the Austrian minister having proposed three questions for consideration, relative to the request of Lucien Bonaparte for passports for himself and son to proceed to America, it was agreed:

1. That North America having received a great number of malecontents and French refugees, the presence of Lucien Bonaparte in the United States would be still more dangerous than it is in Europe, where he can be better watched; and that in consequence it is to be desired that the passports he has asked for should be refused.

2. That in order to deprive him of all plausible motives for soliciting the said passports, it would be equally desirable to refuse them to his son Charles, whose journey seems to be only a pretext for the plans of the father.

3. That the views received by different means from different countries, particularly from Naples, leave no doubt of the intrigue and dangerous relations in which Lucien Bonaparte keeps up in Italy, which Lucien Bonaparte keeps up in Italy, and considering that Rome is per se—and considering that in which superintendence is the most difficult to be exercised, and is exercised with less severity, and that he may not withstanding the refusal of passports find means of deceiving the vigilance of the Roman government, and of escaping to proceed to America; it would be desirable that another abode be assigned him than Rome and the Roman States, by the high allied powers, and that he should be further removed from the coasts, in order to render the plans of escape which he may meditate more difficult.

FROM FORT WILLIAM.
We learn that the Honorable WILLIAM MCGILLIVRAY with the first brigade of North West Traders, had arrived safely at Fort William; in which were found Mr. Spencer, formerly Sheriff of the Red River colony, and three or four other individuals. We are told, they were immediately taken into custody and ordered to Sandwich, where the Western District Court is holden. It is said, that Mr. Smith, Under-Sheriff for the said district, attended by others, clothed with magisterial authority, had gone in quest of Lord Selkirk. The Commissioners had arrived at the Sault St. Marie, and would soon proceed over Lake Superior, for the celebrated Fort William, on which something like a Romance might be written, without partaking of the imaginary tales with which such productions are fraught.

A METEOR.
On Thursday morning, about One o'clock, Mr. Dickinson, a Farmer in the Parish of St. Michel, about 4 miles from town, rose, as had been usual for some nights before, to see whether his neighbours' cattle might not be trespassing on his crop fields. At half past 1 he was struck with a sudden illumination of the expanse of the sky, inasmuch that the most minute article could be discovered on the ground. He observed a brilliant Meteor, attended with a long blue train or tail coming from the West, pursuing an Easterly direction apparently at no great elevation, and gradually descending, for rather better than two seconds, when it disappeared in the rear of the woods, somewhat to the north of Papineau's Road. Mr. Dickinson, thinks it fell not far from the Brick Store, at the foot of St. Mary's Church; when it disappeared; he heard no noise.

From the New York Herald July 7.
The London Traveller, of the 13th May, states, on the authority of private advices from Hamburgh, that serious differences had arisen between the Courts of Stockholm and Copenhagen. The

Emperor of Austria is also stated to have taken possession of Rome.

The probability of a war between Spain and Portugal is spoken of, in consequence of the conduct of the latter, in entering into a treaty with the insurgents. Accounts from Switzerland represent that country to be in a most distressed situation on account of a famine.

A gentleman, passenger in the schooner Milo, arrived this forenoon, states, that when he left Savannah, (29th ult.) Amelia-Island had not been taken possession of by Sir Gregor McGregor, but he contemplated attacking it on the 2d inst. A brig with part of McGregor's troops was spoken off Tybee on the 25th ult. His whole force amounted to from 100 to 150 men, principally from the United States. The force of the Spaniards, at Amelia Island, is stated to be about 50 men.

The British government continue to make great retrenchments in their army and navy—Since 1814, no less than 221,794 have been reduced from the army.

NEW-YORK, July 11.
The Speaker of the House of Commons, it is said, is to be promoted to the House of Lords, by the title of Baron Kidbrooke.

The orders of the Emperor of Russia, for a supply of clothing for his armies from the English manufactories, have been renewed.

Dutch Emigrants.—The Philadelphia papers, of yesterday, mention that the ship *Amazon*, from Holland, had arrived at the Lazaretto, and had brought out 400 passengers—not one of whom, it is said, is over thirty years of age.

African Trade.—It will be seen by a reference to our translations from Havana Papers, in Saturday and this morning's *Courier*, that three thousand three hundred and eighteen African Slaves, arrived at that port, in eight vessels, between the 5th and 20th of June.—*Charleston paper.*

Spafelds.—This spot of ground will soon lose all its notoriety in late affairs. A row of houses is already built before the sign of Merlin's Cave; and the tribune window is recently attractive to the populace, is now completely enveloped. The above fields are, we understand, the property of the Earl of Northampton; and ground has been purchased for the immediate erection of 400 houses.

Successful Commerce.—A merchant of Teignmouth lately freighted a ship at that port, with 37,000 quintals of Newfoundland fish, and sent a cargo to Oporto; after bartering the fish for wines, he sailed for Bristol, where the wines were sold, and from thence returned to Teignmouth, having cleared a net profit of £10,000.
