NEW-YORK, Feb. 6.

To the politeness of Captain Sterling of the fast sailing ship Nestor, in 35 days from Liverpool, we are indebted for Liverpool papers of the 26th, London papers to the 24th, and a file of Lloyd's List to the 23d December.

On the night of the 8th of December, there occurred a severe storm, on the coast of France, by which a number of valuable vessels were wrecked, and many lives lost. Among the vessels wrecked in this storm, the following are noticed in our London papers:

The ship Indian of London, bound to South America, was wrecked at Klouan near Plouguernau, and it is supposed the crew and passengers all perished. Many dead bodies were found in the cabin, among which were several Ladies. She was a vessel of 600 tons. Horses and accoutrements were found on shore supposed to have drifted from the ship. It is added, that among the passengers, were many officers, who were on their way to join the Spanish Insurgents.

On the coast of France generally, accounts have been received, of fourteen sail of merchantmen being wrecked, among them said to be several East and West Indiamen.

A passenger on board the ship Kitty and Clara, from Guernsey, states that a large ship, bound to Ireland, was totally lost on that coast, and all on board drowned.

LONDON, Dec. 23.

An absurd rumour has been circulated in the city this morning, of a change of ministers, which together with other reports, have had their intended effect, that of lowering the price of the funds. The depression this morning has been seriously felt by the large fund-holders, and such was the eagerness to sell, that at a time when 3 per cent. Red. at 80 3/4, an eminent broker offered them at 80 3/8. They were afterwards offered to the Commissioners at 80 1/4. This is a fall of one per cent from the price at which the market opened; but at one o'clock Reduced were 71, and Consols 82, for the opening.

Some intelligence has been received respecting the state of India, which, if correct must prove highly satisfactory. A vessel, named the Eliza is recently arrived from India, on her voyage to England, off Madagascar, spoke the Palladium, a country ship, also on her way homewards. The Palladium left Bengal on the 6th July, and had on board a Government Gazette, wherein was announced the agreeable tidings of a peace with all the Maharratta powers. A territory producing a revenue of one million and a half had been ceded to the Company, to indemnify it for the expenses of the war. Lord Hastings had left Calcutta to see the Treaty executed.

Aberdeen, Dec. 20.

Yesterday morning with nearly a calm, and a noise so dreadful as to resemble the rolling of thunder, the sea running mountains high, portending an easterly gale which commenced violently towards noon, when a brig was observed standing for the harbor. The most painful anxiety was naturally excited for the safety of the hapless vessel, now surrounded with the most tremendous breakers, through which however, she steered so steadily for a considerable time, as to give hopes of her safely gaining the port. But, alas! when within nearly a cable length of the pier, a heavy sea struck the star-board quarter, and the fresh in the river and the ebb tide acting at the same time on the vessel, she broached to, and was overwhelmed by the succeeding wave, when, melancholy to relate, she was engulfed with all on board, in the raging sea, to the inexpressible anguish of thousands, who witnessed the heart rending scene. From part of the wreck, which was soon after cast ashore, the unfortunate vessel proved to be the Gleaner, John Cadenhead, of and for this place, from Shields, coal-laden. The crew consisted of five persons, two or three of whom have left families, who in this trying and afflictive period, we trust shall share the public benevolence, so eminently conspicuous on all occasions of distress.

UKASE.

Addressed to the Legislative Synod at Moscow, by Alexander, Emperor of Russia.

Dated from Moscow, October 27, 1817.

"During my late travels through the Province, I was obliged, to my no small regret, to listen to speeches pronounced by certain of the Clergy in different parts, which contained unbecoming praise on me—praises which can only be ascribed unto God. And as I am convinced in the depth of my heart of the Christian truth, that every blessing floweth unto us through our Lord & Saviour Jesus Christ alone, & that every man, be he whom he may, without Christ, is full only of evil, therefore to ascribe unto me the glory of deeds, in which the hand of God hath been so evidently manifested before the whole world, is to give unto men that glory which belongs unto Almighty God alone.

"I account it my duty, therefore, to forbid all such unbecoming expressions of praise, and recommend to the Holy Synod to give instructions to all the Diocesan Bishops, that they themselves, and the Clergy under them, may, on similar occasions, in future, refrain from all such expressions of praise, so disagreeable to my ears: & that they may render unto the Lord of Hosts alone, Thanksgivings for the blessings bestowed upon us, and pray for the out-pouring of his Grace upon all of us; conforming themselves in this matter to the words of Sacred Writ, which requires us to render to the King Eternal, Immortal, Invisible, the only wise God, honor and glory for ever & ever.

Letters from M. La Cassas.

I. TO LORD SIDMOUTH.

"My Lord—I am extremely sorry that I have the honor to write to your Lordship, and knowing for certain that I shall not remain here long enough to receive your answer, which would perhaps, fulfil my wishes. For these four days I have been in the hands of your State Messenger, who on his arrival, had restored to me my papers, which had been previously sealed up, with the declaration that I might do with them what I thought proper.

"After this he saw me constantly writing, and even encouraged me to do so, and waited till the very moment of my departure to take from me (as I was on the point of setting sail) all my papers, even the most trifling, in your name.

"This is a trap, my Lord, which I cannot find it in my heart to ascribe to any higher person than the man who laid it for me.

"This messenger understood nothing but English. He had an assistant with him who pretended to understand some French, and desired to read the papers one after another, and has notwithstanding, kept them all. He would have had enough to do to read them all in a week, and I did not think that an individual had such a right over me.

"Every thing has been taken from me: letters, notes, my sons' writing books, deeds of property, domestic secrets, official documents of Sir Hudson Lowe and Lord Charles Somerset, my journals, and even a letter to the French Minister of Police, & another to my wife, which being here at leisure, I have already directed, that it might be forwarded as soon as I landed at Ostend. They have been taken from me, without taking any inventory of them or numbering them; and they declared it was done by your Lordship's orders.

"In the first moment of indignation I protested against such violence, and enquired for a Magistrate, that I might make my complaint to him. I will not here repeat the answer I received.

"As there is nothing I so much dislike as to have my name mentioned in public discussions, and considering that it was impossible that you could have prescribed such conduct, which is opposed to all the legal rules in the world, by which public officers must guard themselves against him, who, in such a case might affirm that some papers had been taken away and others substituted; considering this I congealed myself, when I recovered my temper, with trying with all possible
