From the Montreal Gazette.

SIR,

The Editor of the Montreal Herald is extremely humane in his last number. He will not, at this stage of the persecution, irritate party feelings with more Indian stories. He will be silent, and thereby will have the great merit, at least of putting a lock upon his stable after the horses are stolen. But after all, Sir, what do we understand by these stories? We understand that the Honorable Hudson's Bay Company are in fits, and dashing their weak brains at the Head of the Great North west Company. We understand that a visionary parsonage had travelled into the wilderness to build castles in the air; and advancing in disappoinment to the length of his teeth became a Boonpartie in Russia; and that he is now, not at Elba, nor yet at St. Helena, but upon his way to the Old Bailey, trembling before the laws of his country, under a guard of 12 or 15,000 strong.

It we understand all this of the matter, what must we understand of his wares. "Reputation Good my Lord in Man or Woman, is a Jewel"

There is an old adage, but not the less true for being old, which says that one misfortune seldom comes alone. I had the misfortune some 7 or 8 years since, to have an award found against me at Ogdensburgh, in the State of New York, in favour of a man to whom I owed not a farthing, for a sum amounting to nearly 12,000 dollars—and add to this misfortune, I have sustained a loss of reputation in as much as a report has been circulated much to my prejudice, that this poor man had been ruined in consequence of having been by me unjustly kept out of his honest dews. My money I do not like to part with but for an equivalent, but my reputation I hold most sacred. I shall therefore lay before the public such a statement of principal facts relative to that transaction as shall in the eyes of the world either exculpate me

from the charges alleged against my character, or add to it the deep depravity, the atrocious crime of perjury. Therefore upon the solemnity of an oath, and under the full impression of all the solemn obligations thereby imposed, I submit the following statement.

Some time in the latter part of 1809, or commencement of 1810, I contracted to deliver to the house of Messrs Parker, Girard, Oglevie and Co. at Montreal, a quantity of white Oak Staves, not of the description of Staves usually sold in Montreal. But short of thick Staves, the quantity as nearly as I can recollect, was from 18 to 22,000—Which quantity to the highest limits, I contracted with one Horatio G. Bethrong, to deliver me at Montreal, for the purpose of meeting my engagement. But to come at the facts in as few words as possible, when the time drew nigh that the contracts should be fulfilled, I met this said Bethrong at Montreal; he told me he had some Staves, but acknowledged he had not a quantity sufficient to meet his engagement to me. I therefore set about purchasing the Staves in question, but found them extremely scarce, and to be obtained only in small quantities: the exact quantity purchased and paid for by myself, I do not now recollect. But I recollect well of purchasing 3500 from a Mr. Everett of Kingston. I daily visited the rafts in port, and engaged every small parcel I could obtain and when I found there was still a deficiency, I purchased thick pipe Staves and employed men to cut them off to the length required. But notwithstanding every effort, all the Staves I could obtain, added to what Bethrong had supplied, on the morning the contract was to have been fulfilled, there was still a deficiency of one description of Staves of my lowest limits of about 300, and more of Bethrong to me; but for which deficiency I made terms with Messrs Parker and Co. which yet there was sufficient time to have cut off the quantity required, had they been supplied on; thus circumstanced I considered that Bethrong was in my power, but did not intend to avail myself of any advantage I might possess over him in consequence of his neglect. On my return from Montreal, I crossed the river to Ogdensburgh, for the purpose of effecting an arrangement with respect to our transactions, but not finding him at home, when I was about to embark to recross the River, I was arrested at the foot of this same Bethrong, and was informed by the officer, it was for the non-fulfilment of a contract I then procured bail for my appearance at court, and employed Counsel, who assured me from his own knowledge of the transaction between me and Bethrong, that I had nothing to fear from the result.

However, the next news I had from the suit, and several months previous to the time at which I had been bound to make my appearance, was from a man whom I had never seen, stating to me that my Counsel and his friend was dead, that the defence of my suit had fallen into his hands, and that for want of instruction he had suffered a judgement to go against me, (I think at Utica,) and that he had taken the responsibility upon himself of referring all differences to Samuel Sherwood, David Ford and George C. Conant, Esquires.

The time named for the hearing the parties on this question, I think was March, 1811—for having lost or mislaid the papers relative to that transaction, I can speak of dates only from memory, which is less forcibly impressed on my mind than some other parts relating to the transaction. However, when the Referees, the parties with Counsel and the witnesses were assembled, the contract being read upon which the suit was predicated, Bethrong was called on to prove on his part the delivery of the Staves, at time and place and in quantity as therein specified, for which purpose a Mr. Truman Bristol was called, who deposed and said, that he was at Montreal when a quantity of Staves was delivered to Messrs. Parker, Girard, Oglevie & Co. amounting to about 22,000. By one of the Referees—If I understand you right, this quantity of Staves was delivered to the House of Messrs. Parker and Co. by Mr. Bethrong on account of Mr. Whitney, and in fulfilment of the contract which you have heard read.—Witness—a part of them I understood belonged to Mr. Bethrong and a part of them I understood belonged to Mr. Whitney. Do you know what qua-
