## From the Montreal Herald. The late Meetings in U. Canada.

Had these meetings not summoned the attention of the political writers in Boston, they never would have engaged our notice. The Bostonians know well enough that British Subjects have an undoubted right to assemble peaceably in bodies to deliberate on, and petition the Throne for a redress of grievances. Of the extent of grievances which exist in Upper Canada, we have no exact knowledge; but if we are to judge from the sentiments of the Freeholders from York downwards, which includes we suppose the greater half of the population of the Province, we may be led to conclude, that they are not very great nor so alarming as has been represented in the Niagara dist: nor can we agree with an inflammatory writer, that, a "radical change in the System of Government is wanted." If respectable authority is entitled to any credit, abuses have existed in the land board.—Monopolies have been granted, delays have sometimes been unaccountable; too much liberality and too much penuriousness, partialities, and neglects, are said to have characterized the administration in Upper Canada for many years back; and the road laws are a disgrace to the country, inasmuch as the non-resident or resident monopolizers of uncultivated lands, are not bound to contribute to make roads through their own lands; this vast burden falls on the industrious Settlers, who exhaust themselves to enrich others. But will the late meetings lead to any ulterior advantage to Upper Canada, or will the grievances complained of be redressed? We venture to predict that the members of this Grand Convention, will not obtain a single object pointed out in their mission. The good people of Boston ought not to give credit to any prospect of revolt in these Provinces. Our News-papers may express themselves freely on the measures of government; but if they consider those expressions marks of disloyalty, they are miserably mistaken; no battle of Bunker's-hill will follow; no rebellious outrages will tarnish the reputation of these provinces. Our ever weening neighbors need make no calculations on our disaffection to the parent State. We may sometimes complain of land boards—but let the American citizens remember, that for one act of injustice in these provinces, there are fifty committed in the United States, and that corruption here is yet comparatively but a shadow, whereas it has become an actual substance in the boasted land of freedom. We think it probable, that the people composing the Town meetings in the district of Niagara, may, after more mature reflection, find that they have acted rather inconsiderately in being led by any individual, however much his talents may have been the theme of panegyric, or however plausible his abstract arguments; which by the way, may answer in England, but may be exceedingly unfit for Upper Canada, although the laws in both countries are the same. Upon the whole, we think the meetings can be productive of no farther injury than the loss of a Dollar to each individual who subscribed, and about 5 dollars more in expenses and loss of time, besides several mental items which no man can estimate. Their voluntary sacrifices will amount in 1818 to more than the regular taxes laid by the Legislature on the district in two or three years. The Boston Editors ought to be more modest when they make remarks on Conventions. Let them remember their own at Hartford, and how it has since degraded the federal party, and how eager the Chiefs of that party yoked themselves to the Car of a Democratic President, when he visited Boston!

From the Canadian Courant.

In the Canadian Courant, of the 14th instant, we find an account of the bills of Indictment found in the Court of King's Bench against various persons connected with the Hudson's Bay Company, or with the Settlement of Red River, upon charges which are described as similar to those brought against the North West Company, in the Court of Oyer and Terminer. The article is evidently the production of an advocate for the latter Company, and concludes with the following paragraph:
