OBSERVER No. 2-Concluded. I have questioned settlers, sent out by the British government, and discharged soldiers, respecting their grants, and have (with very few exceptions) received answers, that they are satisfied.

There is a sceming distinction in the mode of granting lands, and the term on which settlers receive them; but I am not sufficiently acquainted with that distinction, because my information does not come from an authentic ! source. The distinction is as follows. That persons sent out by the British government, and soldiers discharged in this country, receive their deed clear of Cost. But persons that apply for land at the Provincial land Oihee, whether British horn subjects, or Miens, are charged with a tilling sum of money, on receiving their decide. This is a point of complaint, on which Mr. Gonday and his party, seem to lay much stress, but they are so unfair, anot to mark out the distinction.
