Lethbridge, nor the Brock gun-boat, and the fatal consequence of her falling a mile or two in rear of the line, which she was dependent upon to lead, and cover the landing of; being the sole support from her heavy metal. As I do not boast of much learning, I will not say that Richard Arnold, Esq. had a right to refuse any subject a warrant, when such was made of an offence—which R. D. F. has avowedly confessed and boasted of, although contrary to the tenor of his oath. His reflection upon me as one of Mr. Gourlay's bait—a stranger, insulted & abused, is only contemptible, as I would have baited R. D. F. Esq. under the like impressions, from motives of humanity, notwithstanding my knowledge of him. I will not presume to say that any justice of the Peace, (let his merits be what they may, his loyalty, good will, and services unquestionable) has a right to take bail for the appearance of an offender, before information made, warrant issued, and the prisoner brought before him in a legal manner, as customary before R. D. F.'s attempt for a radical change and reform in the constitution and laws of the United Kingdom of Great Britain.

British Emigration.

We have to touch more than once on this painful topic, and we are again impelled to revert to it. Whatever may be the real cause, it is too true that the mania has taken deep hold of the population of this port and the neighbouring parts around, large portions of which have resolved and are resolving to become inhabitants of American land. During the past and present week in particular, many have embarked; among others, Mr. Hornbrook, a woolen manufacturer, from the neighborhood of Tavistock, who is said to have taken the whole of his establishment, consisting of sixteen men and apprentices, and four women, for the avowed purpose of carrying on his future concern at Pittsburgh the Birmingham of America. We could mention other names, which the public would hear with some surprise. A silversmith at Plymouth is employed almost from morning to night in furnishing the emigrants with gold and silver in exchange for bank paper; and were we to state the amount thus exchanged, and which thenceforth may be considered as totally lost, as well as the possessors, to the mother country, it would be quite evidence enough, if any be wanting, of the spirit of emigration.

On Thursday morning the attention of the inhabitants of Penrith was attracted by the appearance of a large waggon, stupendously laden with household furniture, &c. and with women and children: by the side of which walked a number of men—the whole comprising several families, who were proceeding from Aiston to Liverpool, there to take shipping for America. The sight of nearly 80 of our countrymen, compelled, by the privations attendant on a remorseless system of profuseness and taxation, to bid adieu forever to the land of our fathers, could not fail to awaken in the breasts of the spectators sympathetic emotions.

The success of the late Geo. Cooke, Incledon, and Philips, in

America, has induced several others of the *Corps Dramatique* to follow their example, among which number is Wallack, of Drury lane Theatre.

WESTCHESTER, (Penn.) Aug. 4.
On Friday last a large four horse waggon passed thro' our village, having, besides baggage a full load of people. How many we can't exactly tell; but they looked, for numbers, like the picture in the old primer of John Roger's wife, "with nine children, and one at the breast." We could count twenty, but there were doubtless more. We learn they are from England, lately landed, and now bound for Indiana, probably to the settlement of Mr. Birkbeck whose memoirs we noticed last winter. MILITIA GENERAL ORDERS.

No. 1.—By a Report of a Board of Field Officers, appointed by Militia General Orders of the 7th November, 1815; to investigate the claims for Militia Pay and Allowances in the District of Niagara, still unsettled, in consequence of the death of Paymaster street, it appears that a certain number of claimants were recommended to be paid the amount of their respective claims; which Report was approved by His Excellency Lieutenant Governor Gore and ordered to be paid accordingly.

No. 2.—His Honor the Administrator in consequence of the approved report, and His Excellency Lieutenant Governor Gore's order thereon, directs that Robert Grant, Esquire, late Acting Dep'y Paymaster Gen'l of Militia, be appointed Paymaster for the special purpose of receiving and distributing to the respective claimants, the sum of five hundred and fifty five pounds, one shilling and four pence three farthings, army sterling.

No. 3.—Mr. Grant is not to receive Pay or Allowances from the Government of Upper Canada, during the time he may be employed on this service.

The Court of Assizes lately holden in this Town, was closed on Saturday the 22nd instant. During its sitting, several persons were tried, convicted and sentenced as follows:

John Carscallan, Esq. for forgery, one month's imprisonment and ten pounds fine.

John C. Wilson, Grand Larceny.—Restitution of the stolen property, 3 months imprisonment, and public whipping 39 stripes.

John Grace, Grand Larceny.—one month imprisonment, public whipping 39 stripes, and banishment.

Wm. Cooper, Grand Larceny.—three months imprisonment and ten pounds fine.

Mary Smith, Grand Larceny.—one month imprisonment and private whipping.

Michael Smith, receiving stolen goods.—one month imprisonment and public whipping, 39 stripes.

Jane Smith, receiving stolen goods.—one month imprisonment, and private whipping, 39 stripes.

Noble Bowman, Assault upon a female.—10 days imprisonment and £3 fine.

Alice Braydon, Keeping a House of ill fame.—one month imprisonment, and standing in the pillory half an hour, with a label of her offence on her back.

Mary Flake, Keeping a house of ill fame.—one month imprisonment, and sitting in the stocks half an hour.

ACCIDENT.

Last week a most unfortunate accident occurred near this town to a boy named Tromblais.—Being out on the pasture grounds near Mr. Thibodo's farm, he unluckily leaped on a bundle of hay, under which a pitchfork had been carelessly thrown, one prong of the fork entered the right side a great distance, leaving a dangerous and extensive wound, through which a very large portion of the bowels protruded. Dr. Scott was called in, and after fruitless endeavors to return the portion of bowels protruded through the wound, was obliged to make a larger opening, the great extent of bowels exposed rendering it totally impossible to return them by the original opening.

From the extent and nature of the wound, little hope could have been entertained of the boy's recovery; however, by the steady and intelligent exertions of Dr. Scott, the boy is doing well, and in a few days will be entirely recovered.—It would be unjust to withhold the praise due Dr. Scott on this occasion, who, without the least shadow of any remuneration for his trouble, so generously offered his judicious and well timed assistance.

Capt. R. Bullock has just raised the frame work of a very fine Saw mill, on his estate in the English Settlement, Murry; where his rapid and excellent improvements excite the surprize of those who visit his

farm. Indeed these Emigrant Settlers in general, deserve much commendation for their patient perseverance, and industry. In addition to the clearing up of their farms, in proportion to their opportunities, a fine road is nearly completed, connecting the Darnford and Presque Isle roads. Considering how much human industry is stimulated by approbation and example, it is surprizing that the improvements of Canada are not oftener noticed in our public journals.

Extract of an Act of agreement between Upper and Lower Canada, [Passed 1st April, 1818.]

Article 3d.—And whereas it is expedient to guard against the introduction of dutiable articles which (consideration being had to the local situation of Upper Canada) may be brought into this Province from the United States of America, without having paid the duties in the said Province of Upper Canada: Be it enacted by the authority aforesaid, that no article of Merchandize, subject to duty upon entry at the Port of St Johns, shall be allowed to pass as on transit from Upper Canada by Coteau du Lac, unless the person or persons bringing the same, shall produce to the Inspector, a Certificate from an officer duly authorised by law, or in the interim authorised by the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or person administering the Government of Upper Canada, that such articles of Merchandize were bona fide shipped or laden in the Province of Upper Canada, or have paid duties there.
