An unusual number of British ships have arrived in the ports of the United States within the last month. In the port of Norfolk, particularly, there are a great many; eight or ten having recently entered that harbor from the West Indies

The Navigation Act of last fession, it will be recollected, provides that, from and after the 30th of September, 1818, the ports of the United States shall be closed against vessels owned by ritish subject arriving from any colony, the ports of which by the ordinary laws of the country, are closed against vessels owned by citizens of the United Statesthis provision not to be affected by such veffels having touched at a port which is open. The law further provides that, after the date, the owner or agent of any British vessel loading with the produce of the United States within our ports (except necessary sea stores) shall give bond not to land them in a British colony or territories not open to our

from doing fo. Halifax and St. Johns, Nova Scotia, have been declared free ports, by a British order of council :- that is, American and other veffels have permiffion to take thither certain enumerated articles of provisions, &c. on like conditions as they enter Liverpool and other ports in Great Britain .- Great Britain has followed the Spanish policy, of excluding all nations from her colomal ports, in order to monopolize their tride. The recent order is an amelioration of the fystem; and if we are to icredit a speech ascribed to Caftlereagh, the same liberality may ere long be ex-!tended to her colonies in the Indies. His lordship infilts on the policy of the universal freedom of commerce-of permitting to foreigners a participation in trade on the same footing as British inhjects. This principle, if carried into general practice by commercial nations, would most benefit those who enjoy the greatest share of navigation; consequently Great Britain and the United States would be the greatest gainers by its universal adoption.
