Moft of the dogs of this country me of little uie, and many of them are worfe than ulelefs; they are troubiefome and voracious. In fome places, they kill almost as many freep as the butchers; and the blame is laid to the walves. The food confomed by dogs is a needless wafte, a lofe to the country. That pret of it white would not be caten by human beings, might, not of it, be faved, by being given to ofeful dometic animals, fuch as pige and poultry, whose meat supplies our tables and markets A confiderable portion of the provisions confumed by dogs, with and without the confeat of their owners, is fuitable for humas food, and would be fullerient for the fullenance of many hundreds of children and grown persons. To shock the evil, of which we are speaking, it has been proposed, that a tax he laid upon dege, as articles of loxury, or rather of Inperfleity. Such a tax, however, would fall more heavily upon the poor, than the rich; for the peorer people are the more dogs they generally keep It is an unaccountable! circumstance; but it is probably a fact. It certainly appears to to travellers. The Gentlemen, to whom I have already referred, observed, that when he faw a man furreanded by two on three dogs, or a kennal of them ruthing out of his door, to bark at paffengers in the Breet, he was disposed, without further enquiry, to place that man down, in his opinion, as both poarand vulgar. How far a dagtax would correct this vulgar tafte, cas. not be ascertained, until the experiment be actually made. In the mean time, as people are more enally led, than coeiced by law, with regard to their fashions, the opinion and example of men of fense may, in this as well as other respects, have a talutary influence upon the prevailing custom of the country.
