Among the proceedings of our Provincial House of Commons, published in your paper, I observed, that they had authorised their Speaker to employ legal counsel to draft a bill for them. That, said I to myself, as I read it, that is right. If the members seek counsel among themselves, they do right to seek it out of the House.

On the 14th inst. Paul Brown and Francis Minin Boucher were arraigned before the Court of Oyer and Terminer and General Goal Delivery for the Home District, on an indictment preferred against them, under the provisions of the Statute of the 43d of the King, as principal in the murder of Robert Sample, commonly called Governor Sample, at Red River, in the Indian territories, on the 19th June, 1816.

The prisoners were remanded to goal to answer to another indictment preferred against them, and others, for the murder of our Alexander McLean, at Red River, on the same day as aforesaid: but the Attorney General yesterday morning stated to the Court, that as the offences charged against these persons, in the indictment also before the Court, had reference to the same affray in which Governor Sample lost his life, and as they had been the preceding day acquitted of abetting, aiding and assisting in the murder of Governor Sample, he thought it could not further the ends of Justice to try them again, and moved to enter a Nolle Prosequi, as to those two individuals.

Bills of Indictment have also been found by the Grand Jury as follows: viz.

- AGAINST Guthbert Grant and Louis Perrault. For the murder of Robert Sample and Alexander McLean, at Red River, on the 19th June, 1816. As Accessories before the fact. As Accessories after the fact. For Arson. For maliciously shooting at Miles McDonnell, Esq. and others. Larceny on a Navigable River. Larceny from the dwelling-house. As Accessories before and after the fact.

Latest from England

The Ship Belfast, Captain Bunker, arrived this morning in 43 days from Liverpool. By this arrival we have been favoured with the Liverpool Mercury of the 18th of Sept. from which we copy several articles in relation to the Markets at Liverpool, London, and Dublin.

The Queen of England continued very ill. The bulletin of the morning of the 16th Sept. stated that she had passed a good night, and was easier that morning.

The British Ship of war Griffon, which left St. Helena on the 2d of August, and which has arrived at Portsmouth, brings the information that the Squadron on that station was extremely sickly, and that several of the ships had buried a large portion of their crews, from dysenteries and liver complaints. The colony also was very sickly, from the prevalence of the same diseases, which are there peculiarly fatal.
