

To Officers on Half-Pay in Canada.

It is desired that Officers receiving Half-Pay or Military Pensions, through the Commissariat in Canada, will transmit to their several Agents, at Quebec, their Affidavits in Triplicate immediately after the 24th of the period when their Half-Pay becomes due; so that the Affidavits of Officers residing in Lower Canada shall arrive at Quebec before the 10th, and those of Officers residing in the Upper Province before the 20th of the following Month, at which period the returns will be made up. As more than sufficient time is given for Communications to reach Quebec from the most distant Posts, those Officers' Affidavits which do not arrive in time to be incorporated in these returns, must remain over till the ensuing period of Payment.

FOREIGN NEWS.

From the N. Y. Com. Advertiser, April 2. FROM ENGLAND

The following vessels were to be launched at Plymouth, early in the spring; Faudroyant, 82 guns; Sterling Castle, 74; Portland, 60; Lancaster, 60; Pyramus, 42. The Active frigate, Sir James Gordon, is fitting at Portsmouth for Quebec; Capt Barry is appointed naval commissioner at that place, and goes out in the frigate.

M. Beauregard, formerly physician to Bonaparte, was to leave England early in the month of March for St. Helena, as medical attendant to the ex-emperor.—This appointment is sanctioned by the allies.

A recent arrival from Sierra Leone, informs that the slave trade was in a prosperous state on the coast.

An association has been formed at Treves for the establishment of a settlement in the United States. Great numbers are ready to embark.

France is engaged in establishing a colony in Senegal, for the cultivation of cotton, sugar, coffee, and sugar.

A letter from Stockholm of Jan 15 contradicts the report, of Sweden having sold the Island of St. Barholm news.

Count Regnaud, (St. Jean d'Angely,) has obtained permission to return to Paris.

THE PRINCESS OF WALES.

Extract of a letter from Milan, dated Jan. 1.

The Princess of Wales is making preparations for a trip to the Holy Land.—The queen and young Austin, (who is always addressed by the title of a Prince) accompany her Royal Highness, together with a vast suite. The Princess told the marchioness of Douglas, that it was her intention to be absent six months; and that she meant to visit all the places of note in Egypt. During the Princess's absence, her new palace will proceed. Two gentlemen lately arrived from England had a long conference with her Royal Highness.—Morning paper.

Tombuco.—A young French traveller, nephew to Count Mollien, ex-minister, has succeeded in reaching Tombuctoo by way of Senegal. His family have just received a letter from him in which he announces his safe arrival in that celebrated town, hitherto unknown to Europeans, and which the unfortunate Mungo Park twice vainly attempted to reach. French paper.

From the Albany Argus.

A letter from Tunis, probably written by the American Consul, gives a most heart rendering account of the horrors caused by the plague in that city and regency. The deaths in the latter are estimated at 2000 daily, and in the city, having a population of 100,000, at 300 and 350. It had raged there 8 months, and carried off 15,000 persons in the city. One vast suburb was literally depopulated. "As I sat in my parlour I heard during the day almost one unbroken song from the funeral processions passing beneath the windows, like patrons of the same army, often bearing two bodies on the same bier, and of which no less than 90 have fallen under our observation in the course of a few hours. The stillness of the night is broken by the shrieks of women, heard from every quarter, lamenting in the oriental manner over the bodies of those who have just ceased to live. The plague has broken out with new violence at Algiers.

London, Feb 24.

Three Mails from Hamburg and one from Holland have arrived, the contents of which are unimportant. It is stated from the French frontiers that considerable desertions have taken place from the army of the north. The Government of the Netherlands are actively proceeding with the erection of frontier fortresses in all directions. Letters from Hanover state, that the Duke and Duchess of Clarence will set out from Hanover, on their return to England, at the end of the present or in the beginning of the next month.

From the Baltimore Patriot, April 7.

By a gentleman from St. Thomas, we are favored with the following state of affairs on the Spanish Main.

MARGARETTA, March 17, 1819.

We learn that affairs are going on very prosperously in that quarter. On the 6th of March, near Calaugua, the army of Morillo was attacked by gen. Pies, who completely defeated the Royalists with the loss of 600 killed on the field—no prisoners. Loss of the Patriots 64 killed. Morillo and his army retreated to a retreat was impossible; and that gen. Bolivar was only waiting for a division of 2500 English troops, which were ascending the Orinoco to join him, when the destruction of Morillo and his army would be inevitable; 500 English troops had arrived at Juan Griego. (Margaretta) and colonel English with 250 more was daily expected, when the expedition fitting out against Cumana, at Juan Griego, under the command of gen. Oudinette, will be 6000

strong (3000 English and 3000 natives) assisted by the Squadron, consisting of 15 sail well manned and equipped, under the command of Admiral Brion. Generals Oudinette and Valde, with col. Needham and several other officers of distinction, had arrived at Juan Griego, from Auguflura, to join the expedition.

Admiral Brion had sailed on the 14th in pursuit of the royal Squadron, and on the 16th chased them into Cumana Bay, when a dreadful cannonading took place, and continued the whole day—the result of the attack was not known.—The independence of Venezuela will be completed to a certainty the ensuing campaign—the resources of the Patriots in men, money, and every thing, are great.

The Patriot brig, the Inimitable, of 14 guns, arrived at Juan Griego. (Margaretta) on the 16th, bringing with her His Catholic Majesty's late brig Neceyda, of 18 guns and 42 men, captured in Jan. 9, 17. A long 34 W. after an action of 14 minutes. The Neceyda lost 38 killed and 22 wounded. The Inimitable suffered much in spars, rigging and sails, but had none killed and only the sailing master slightly wounded.

The Neceyda is a very superior vessel of her class, built and launched in France four months since for the Spanish government, mounts 18 twenty four pounders, tons about 450, and was at the time of her capture on her way from Cadiz to Rio Janeiro, with despatches announcing the death of the Queen of Spain, &c. All the despatches fell into the hands of the Patriots—she fought desperately until the captain fell, being badly wounded.

Norfolk, April 6.

Very late from England.—The Philip Tabb, Capt. Wheeler, arrived in Hampton Roads on Saturday afternoon. Left London the 28th of February, and the Downs the 26 of March.

But little business was doing in American Staples there; there had been a number of failures and the market for Tobacco and Cotton continued depressed.

There had been a low gale of wind about the 22d February, which did considerable damage to the shipping in the British channel; in one instance in particular, an English packet bound to France was sunk, and every person on board perished.

INDIA.

CALCUTTA, Nov. 4.

The first division of the volunteers, destined for Ceylon, embarked yesterday, when the ships dropped down the river. The intelligence from Ceylon continues every day more and more favourable; and no doubts are now entertained of the tranquillity of the island having been reestablished. On the arrival of the volunteers, the 20th regiment, now at Ceylon, will embark for Prince of Wales' Island, Bencoolen, &c. Rumors are abroad, that another destination, having some important political ends in view, awaits the marine regiment.

We have nothing to offer to our readers of any importance, in the way of intelligence from central India. The returning tranquillity of the provinces, so lately the seat of rapine and war, is fortunately taking away the interest we once felt, in accounts from that part of the country; and leaves the journalist little else to do, than record his sense of the wisdom and vigor of the policy, whose good fruits appear in the barrenness of his own columns.

The activity in the money market of Calcutta continues still to be felt. Is it not worth enquiring into, how far a commercial bank, on a large and liberal scale of accommodation would tend to obviate evils, arising from the circulating medium being too limited for the trading operation, which the spirit of mercantile speculation has created?

From Jackson's Oxford Journal.

LONDON, JANUARY 21.

The reigning Queen of Wirtemberg is the Royal person whose death was announced in the Flanders Papers received yesterday. Her Majesty was sister of the Emperor of Russia and the same Lady who, as Duchess of Oldenberg, resided at the Pulteney Hotel, during the visit of the Royal Sovereigns to this country. Her first husband, the Duke of Oldenburg, served in the Russian campaign, and died of a fever caught on his attendance in the hospitals to visit his sick officers and soldiers. She next married the Hereditary Prince, now King of Wirtemberg, who survives her, by whom she has left issue. The last two years have proved peculiarly fatal to Royalty. Within that period it has lost four of its most distinguished and exalted females; first, our ever-to-be-lamented Princess Charlotte of Wales—next, her Majesty, our late gracious Queen—lately, the Queen of Spain—and now the interesting and amiable Queen of Wirtemberg.
