AGRICULTURAL.

From the Literary Panorama.

On forcing Fruit Trees to Blossom and bear Fruit.

By the Rev. G. L. Temple.

In my early years, I saw my Father,
who was fond of Pomology, and skilled in
that science, cutting a ring on several branches
of trees which already were in blossom,

With a sharp knife make a cut in the
bark of the branch which you mean to
force to bear, and not far from the place
where it is connected with the stem; or if
it be a small branch, or shoot, near where
it is joined with the larger bough;

1. You may compel every young tree,
of which you do not know the sort, to
show its fruit, and decide sooner, whether,
being of a good quality, it may remain
in its first state or requires to be grafted.

The branches so operated, are hung
with fruit; while the others that are not
ringed, offer nothing, or very little
upon them.

Harrowing small grain in the spring.
We have not room now, for an essay,
of the subject required, but we cannot

permit another week to pass, without re-
commending the farmer to pass the har-
row over his fields of small grain. We
are confident that it must have a fine ef-
fect, in giving it an early start, and en-
abling it to outgrow most of its enemies.

At all events, it is easy to make the
trial.—Let a few breadths be harrowed,
the same way the grain was ploughed in
—numerous plants will be torn up, and
the operation will, apparently, menace
universal destruction; but it will be
found, that what remains, will spread
and thrive much better and more than
make up for the little destroyed.

Perhaps, for this operation, the com-
mon old wooden tooth harrow, with blunt
teeth, would answer as well, if not better,
than any other—and it is well if it can
be made to answer any purpose well. At
all events this harrowing is strenuously
recommended by some of the best Penn-
sylvania farmers,—therefore, we repeat,
make the trial on a small scale, and then
you will know, another year.—American
Farmer.

Summer wheat.—It is perhaps not ge-
nerally known, that lands which will
produce but little or no winter wheat,
will produce a handsome crop of the
summer kind. You may sow it soon after
the frost is out of the ground, and it
will be fit for harvest about two weeks
after that sowed in the fall. The wheat
will be sweet, and white: and to me in-
finitely preferable to rye.

I have known lands which would pro-
duce no rye but blasted, yield twenty-
six bushels to the acre.

There are some advantages with re-
spect to this kind of grain worthy the at-
tention of my fellow farmers—it cannot
be winter killed—it will do well to sow
in the spring where other grain has been
winter killed, and will make flour super-
ior to rye.

To me it appears, that owing to the
present extraordinary winter, much of
our grain will be killed; and if it should
prove the case, I know of no better way
to remedy the evil, than to improve the
same land with summer wheat.
