

AGRICULTURAL. At a meeting of a number of the Inhabitants of the Johnstown District, at Brockville, on Wednesday the 19th of 1819 May, pursuant to public potice; Charles Jones Esq. having been Called to the Chair and Adial Sherwood Esq. appointed Clerk .- It was unanimously resolved that the formation of a society for the promotion of Agriculture, Manufactures, and improvement of BreedCattle, would be highly beneficial to the interests of the District.

The Constitution for the said Society was then proposed, and unanimously adepted .- In pursuance of the third Article thereof Charles Jones Esq. of Brockville was elected President; Daniel Buritt jr. Esq. of Marlborough and Mr. John Kilborn in the rear of Elizabeth Town Vice Presidents : Rod :ick Easten Esq. of Brockville Treasurer; and Mr. James Hall of the same place Secretary.

At the same time it was, also resolved, that on the first Monday of May in each and every year, there shall be a fair at Brockville and on the first Monday of October in each and every year, there shall be a fair and Cattle show at Brockville.

A Subscription was opened and in a few hours the liberality of all Classes realized the sum of £150, (which exceeded the expectations of the most sanguine) which, with the additional sums, to be, hereafter added, will be appropriated to the use of the present year according to the laws of the said Society. Here follows the Constitution of the Society &c. &c.

We whose names are hereunto subscribed do hereby associate our selves as a society under the name and style of the District of Johnstown Agricultural Society, and do adopt the following Constitution.

1st. The society shall be composed of ordinary and honorary Members.

2d. Every Member shall pay not less than five shillings annually to the treasurer, which together with the extra Subscriptions, as hereto annexed, shall constitute a fund to be disbursed in premiums and Contingent Charges in pursuance of Rules and Regulations to be hereafter made.

3d. The Officers shall consist of a President, two Vice Presidents, a Treasurer and Secretary, together with the viewing Committee of Agriculture, for examining crops standing in the field and farms offered for premiums; as also the standing Committees for the encouragement of Agriculture, Manufactures. and the Breeding of Domestic Animals.

4th. The general administration of the affairs of the Society shall be managed by an Executive Committee, to consist of the President, two Vice Presidents, the Treasurer, the Secretary and the Chairman of the Standing Committees for the encouragement of Agriculture, Mannfactures and the Breeding of Domestic Animals, which are to be appointed by the Executive Committee; they shall also fix the amount of all premiums ; admit ordinary and honorary members regulate the Cattle show and fairs; and perform all acts which they may deem useful: and for the promotion of the objects of this Association, said Committee shall meet at such times as shall be established by the bye law- to be hereafter adopted, by a majority when duly Convened, of which the President or one Vice President shall form a part of the number, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

5th. Every person who shall subscribe this Constitution, and pay the sum of five shillings annually for the use and purposes of this Society, shall from the time of paying the same, become a Memher thereaf, and he entitled to rate stall General Meetings, and be oligible to any office in the Society, the Officers of which are to be elected by the Majority of votes, at the annual meeting, for that purpose.

6th. There shall be a General Meeting of the Society held at Brockville on the first Monday in May in each and every year. for the purpose of electing a President, two Vice Presidents, Treasurer and Secretary, to serve for the year then next ensuing; and for inspecting the procredings and accounts of the preceeding

7th. The Executive Committee shall have power to call a General Meeting of the Society at any time they may think proper; always giving ten days previous public Notice; the said Committee shall have power to fill any vacancies which may occur amongst the Officers of the Society by death, removal, or refusal to act, to serve until the next General yearly Meeting of the Society for the apwointment of Officers.

8th. The Treasurer shall have the charge of Collecting all Monies which may become due to the Society by subscription, or otherwise.

9th. Any Member of this Society who shall refuse or neglect to pay the amount of his annual subscription of five shillings, for the space of six months, after the same becomes due, shall be liable to be declared to be no longer a Member of the Society, but shall be entitled to be readmitted at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

10th. No Salary or pecuniary reward

shall be allowed to any Officer or Committee of tais Society for discharging their Otlicial Duties.

Pruning Fruit Trees. The following remarks, we believe, are from a fource which entitles them to the attention of farmers

Meffrs Ide & lidrich. I observed in your present week's paper, a call on farmers, by faying that prudent ones will not let this feafon of the year pals, without pruning their fruit trees, and flating the good effects it will have, &c. The good effect of feafonable and proper trimming of fruit trees, is obvious to every person who has paid much attention to the culture of fruit ; but from observation. I have made for 20 or 30 years patt, I am thoroughly convinced that the former method of pruning trees in March and April is very injurious to orchards, and particularly to nurferies which have been long neglected, and require much trimming. I have offerved fmall trees, which have, in confequence of a close trimming in March, died by reason of the drying winds penetrating the wounds fo deep, and letting fuch a quantity of the sap and moilture escape before the sap begins to move up, and supply the loss. In this cafe the bark adheres to the wood, in fuch a manner, that it is not in the power of the fap again to afcend; and of course the sapling dies. But this is not apt to be the cafe with larger trees, when deprived of those supernumerary branches. which in rdinary cases will require to be taken off ; but they will nevertheless Inffer great damage by fuch amputations at this feafon of the year. If a limb of any confiderable fize is cut feveral inches from the body in arch, the flump will become dry and crack open nearly to the body; fex confift of a large frame House, two sto and before the new growth can heat over the would, the flump will rot, and this defection will foon penetrate to the heart of the tree, and the whole will foon decay. Whoever will take the trouble to obfirve old orchards, which formerly were trim med in March. will find, that almost every inflance in which a limb of any confidera ble fiz had been taken off, instead of the wound being healed. an the tree found and healthy a large cavity is tound, beginning at the wound and rapidly increasing towards the heart, which foon deprives the tree of health and vigor. In almost every inflace where I have taken off a limb in June, when the tree is full of fap, if the flump be left fmooth, the new growth immediately commences its healing perations, and inflead of decaying and dying, the wound is foon healed over, and the tree remains found and flourishing. I believe the best time in the year for trim ming trees is when the tree possesses the greatest quantity of fap, which I think is

not far from the middle of June. Many farmers do not e mmence trimming their young orchards fo foon by five. and in some cases, by ten years, as they ought. They fay the tree grows well and bears well, and why should I meddle with it? The fact is, many of our orchards are fet in good fertile land, and their growth is rapid and in many inflances fend out three or four times as many branches as the root is able to support in old age : and if they are fuffered to remain. the tree will foon dwindte and become thrubby, and die : or, if the branches are taken off when they are large, the tree will be much more injured, than it would have been, had they been taken off (maller.
