## FARMERS, SHEAR YOUR LAMBS.

The subject of shearing lambs is one that ought to engage the attention of every farmer. It has been proved by experience, that to shear lambs is not only profitable to the farmer, but of great advantage to the lamb itself. Every man's observations have shown him that when sheep are shorn, the ticks will all leave them and adhere to the lambs; whereas if lambs are shorn, the ticks will leave them and stay with the sheep, who can bear them with less injury. It has been satisfactorily ascertained, that when lambs are shorn, the fleece, the next season, will be of much better quality, and equal in quantity. The proper time for shearing lambs, is the first and second weeks in July. The wool shorn from the lambs will always meet with a ready sale, and a fair price to the hatter, who is now obliged to pay his money for such wool at some market town. If farmers would all shear their lambs, it would not only be a clear saving to themselves, but a great saving to the country.

## TO PRESERVE PLANTS FROM INSECTS

Translated from the French

Receipt of a liquid, which has the property of destroying the insects, caterpillars, grubs, bugs, ants, &c. &c. which attach themselves to plants, &c.

Take of black soap, best quality, 3 or 2 lbs; brimstone, 3 do.; wood mushrooms, 2 do.; rain or river water, 60 pints; divide the water into two equal parts; take one half and put it into a barrel that is not to be put to any other use; melt the soap in it, and add thereto the mushrooms, after having bruised them a little; boil in a large pot the remaining part of the water; put the brimstone in a clean piece of linen and make a bundle of it, tied up with a twine: you must attach thereto a stone, or weight, to make it lay at the bottom of the pot; let it boil for 20 minutes, taking care to stir the water all the while, with a stick, that it may take the colour and strength of the brimstone; if you double the quantity of these ingredients, the effect of the water will be more sure. You must pour the boiling water into the barrel, and stir it a second time; and every day it must be again stirred, until the whole becomes extremely fetid—the more old and fetid it is, the better. You must take care to have the barrel well stopp'd every time it has been stirred.

When you want to use this water, it is sufficient to pour some over the plants; but the best manner is to decant it into a common watering pot, and sprinkle the plants therewith, which will have the desired effect.

N. B. The sediment, remaining after the water is all drawn off, should be placed where none of the domestic animals can have access to it.
