Statutes of Upper Canada.

(Assessment Act concluded)

XI. And le it further enacted by the authority aforefied, That the Collector may deduct at the rate of five pounds for every hendred pounds, and no more, as a full compensation for his service in collecting, any law to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the Treasurer shall give a receipt for all money paid to him by any Collector, which receipt shall be to such Collector a sufficiert acquittance.

XII. And be it further enacted by the authority of sefaid, That His Majefly's Surveyor General of this Province, for the time being, hall on or before the first day of July, which will be in the year of our Lord one moufand eight hundred and twenty, furnish the Treasurer of each and every Diffrie thereof, with a lift or schedule of the Lots in every Town, Town this or reputed Township of his respective Diftrict, as the same are delignated by numhers and corcessions, or otherwise, upon the original plan thereof, in which lift it shall be specified, in columns opposite to each lot respectively, to whom the faid | lot, or any and what part thereof, has been described as granted by His Majeffy, and whether the fame, or any and what part thereof, be yet ungranted, and also what lots are referred as Crown or Clergy Keferves, or for other public purpofes, and to whom fuch referves, or any and what part thereof have been leafed by His Majefty, and shall on or befor the first day of July in every year thereafter, transmit to the Treasurer of such District respectively, a fehedule of all fuch lots or parcels of land, specifying the number of Acres or other less quantity of land in each, as have been granted or fet to leafe by His Majesty, fince the last schedule by hun furnish

premises on which such diffress was made. XIV. THE PERSON NAMED IN THE PERSON NAMED IN COLUMN FOREIGN NEWS.

From the New York Ev. Post, Aug. 4.

The verbal accounts received last evening, by the sloop of war Hornet, from Cadiz, are calculated to induce a belief that this country is on the eve of a war with Spain, because she has not yet ratified the treaty negociated at Washington last winter, which cedes to the United States the Floridas. Some difficulties, it seems, exist with regard to the ratification, but there is little rause to believe that Spain, single-handed, will undertake to measure swords with this country. We have conversed with a gentleman belonging to the Hornet, who is of opinion that ultimately the treaty will receive the sanction of the King of Spain. The Spanish squadron, spoken of in the following article, is no doubt destined for South America, and not Florida. A few divs, however, will, in all probability, clear up all doubts on this head, as Captain Reid, bearer of despatches to our government, left here this morning for Washington.

From the National Advocate of this morning.

Highly important .- By the arrival yesterday afternoon of the United States' ship Hornet, Captain Reid, from Cadiz, which place she left on the 2d July, we are informed that the treaty was not rate. ified at the time of her sailing, nor is it probable it ever will be. The Spanish ministry were debating warmly on that subject when Captain Reid left Madrid, (June 22d.) The Spaniards at Cadiz say, it will not be ratified, for fear of exciting the displeasure of Great Britain.

A Spanish squadron of 6 ships of 74 guns, 8 of from 38 to 44 guns, and several sloops of war, &c. were lying in the harbor of Cadiz. It was currently reported there that 18.000 troops would also embark, and the whole would be destined for the PROTECTION OF THE FLORIDAS, and not for South America, as was originally contemplated. A French squadron of 1 frigate and 6 brigs have joined the expedition; we learn they will sail under the Spanish

An action was fought at Cadiz, about the 15th June, between the Spanish national gun brig Voluntario, of 14 guns, and the Buenos Ayres government brig Independencia, of 18 guns,-when, shameful to relate, the latter was defeated. The Voluntario had arrived at Cadiz, much cut up in sails and rigging .-Both vessels fought under the flag of the United States!!!

The officers and crew of the patriot privateer Constitution, taken sometime since near Gibraltar, (after being on shore) are at Cadiz in dungeon. Gen. O'Donnel, (governor of Cadiz,) had received an order from the King, granting a pardon to all Spanish subjects found on board that vessel, and a command to execute all the foreigners; he, however, remonstrated against this barbarity. The result of his refusal we do not know-70 Americans are among the prisoners.

About the 20th June, the Marquis De Casse Yrujo and family, were taken at midnight from their dwelling in Madrid, and banished to some foreign parts. The nature of their crimes and place of exile is a secret-some even suppose that they have been assassinated.

The U. S. Ship Franklin, arrived at Cadiz on the 20th June, with the hon. Jonathan Russel, and family ; but finding they could not be accommodated with passage on board the Hornet, they returned in her to Gibraltar on the 27th, where they will embark in a merchant ship for the United States. All our squadron is at Gibraltar.

The French National Corvette, La Normande, was to sail from Cadiz, on the 15th July, for New-York, to invite home all the French exiles. Mr. Tunis, our consul there, will return in her.

Dr. Heap, and Lt. Berry, of the navy, are passengers in the Hornet.

By the Hornet, we have received a Cadiz Gazette, of June 27, containing & proclamation requiring from the masters of all foreign vessels that enter the port of Cadiz, a certificate from the Spanish consul, at the port fr m whence the vessel sailed, of her origin.
