### FOREIGN NEWS.

*From the New-York Ev. Post, Aug. 18.*

Foreign news.—By the arrival yesterday afternoon of the ship *Hector*, Gillester, we received London papers to the 23d and Liverpool to the 25th of June. They furnish nothing very important. It is stated from Rome that *Lucien Bonaparte* had recently applied to the government for permission to send his eldest son to his brother Joseph in America, and that Mr. Russell, the American minister in Sweden, was to arrange the young man's voyage, but that permission had been refused, at the same time advising *Lucien* to apply to the allied powers. The propensity to emigrate to America from the continent of Europe increases. Several thousands it is stated are preparing to embark from the kingdom of Württemberg. On the 18th of June the king's messenger left London with despatches for Naples. A violent shock of an earthquake was felt at Corneto on the 26th of May, and all along the whole coast of the Mediterranean, which damaged several edifices. Two very destructive fires, one at the village of Kuchel, in the vicinity of Presburg, the other at Grefen, in the province of Posen, broke out the latter part of the month of May, and destroyed property to a large amount, besides many lives. At the former place 116 houses and 52 barns and a number of cattle were consumed; and at the latter 235 houses were destroyed. The right honorable *Robert Dundas*, late Lord Chief Baron of the Court of Exchequer, London, died on the 16th June at his country seat—*Sir Samuel Shephard* has been appointed his successor. Private letters from Hamburg announce the failure of the house of *Warburgh & Co.* of Altona.

The citizens of Liverpool were gratified and astonished by the arrival, at that port, on the 21st of June, of the beautiful steam ship *Savannah*, captain *Rodgers*, in 26 days from Savannah, and 41 from London. She was five days in the channel, before she got up to Liverpool, and worked her engine eighteen days of the passage. She is the first ship, on this construction, that has undertaken a voyage across the Atlantic. She was built in this city, and is 350 tons. The London papers will have it that she is going to St. Petersburg, as a present from the United States to the Emperor of Russia.

On the 21st of June, the cash payment bill underwent an animated debate in the House of Lords, and was ordered to a third reading on the Wednesday following.

On the same day, in the House of Commons, the foreign enlistment bill underwent a third reading, and passed; yeas 190, nays 129; majority 61.

The marriage of the King of Spain with the Princess *Josephine*, the youngest daughter of *Prince Maximilian of Saxony*, seems to be determined.

London, June 19.

The loan bill passed the house of lords last night. In the course of the short discussion, the earl of Liverpool said that he did not foresee that any future loan or funding would be wanted during the continuance of peace, & he congratulated the country on the termination of the practice of borrowing money by this means, as, by its incitement to gambling, he considered it most injurious to the pursuits of regular trade and industry.

We are happy to state, that part of the master manufacturers have agreed to give 8s. 9s. and 10s. per cut of gingham, 11, 12, and 13ths. instead of the late prices averaging about 1s advance on the cut. All the workmen are actively employed in finishing the webs which they had begun previously to the turn out, thus manifesting their entire obedience to the law, though it is understood that they have expressed their determination not to continue in the employment of those who refuse the advance, after the present work is finished.

June 21.

The observations made by the Earl of Liverpool on Friday evening in the House of Lords, with regard to the Loan Bill, was in substance, that he hoped no further loan would be required during the continuance of peace, with the exception of about £5,000,000, which would be wanted to make good the payments next year to the Bank of England, in pursuance of the wish to that effect expressed by their Lordships and the other House.

America and her Resources.—We are glad to observe that the public attention has lately been directed by an eminent reviewer towards this work of Mr. *Bristed*, which cannot but prove highly interesting to the English reader from the account it gives of the state of society, manners, politics, internal regulation, &c. of the United States, rectifying, as it does, many misconceptions and erroneous notions respecting that Republican Empire.

We are happy to state, that the very respectable American and Hamburg house which stopped payment in the beginning of last week, was on Saturday enabled to resume its payments.

The Duchesse de Berry is stated to advance happily in her pregnancy.

The Duchesse of Modena was safely delivered of a son on the 2d instant.

There is a long letter from Madrid in the *Constitutionnel*, in which England is accused of acting upon a regular system for the purpose of crippling the resources

of Spain. After alluding to the cession of the Floridas, the letter observes, "It is now understood that the Havannah will soon cease to belong to us."

From Vienna it is mentioned, that the surveillance, over the members of the Bonaparte family in that capital, has been for some time much relaxed.

June 22.

An epidemic fever is stated to be prevalent at St. Vallery in the Department of Seine Inferieure, which has carried off nearly 100 persons in less than a week.

The following account is from a Glasgow paper:—On the 16th inst. a numerous meeting of the operative weavers took place in the Green. A resolution was read, the purport of which was to Petition the Prince Regent to grant the spare hands of the trade, or such as were inclined, the means of reaching the colonies belonging to his majesty in North America, together with the means of support for one year after their arrival there; which sums they promised to repay by yearly remittances of produce; but on a show of hands very few agreed to this proposition. A second resolution was submitted to the meeting, as an amendment to the foregoing, there should be annual parliaments, universal suffrage, and a diminution of taxation, which amendment was carried apparently by a large majority, and with great cheering.

June 23.

We received yesterday the Paris papers of Saturday last. On Friday, in the Chamber of Deputies, in the course of the resumed discussion of the *Projet of Estimates or Supplies*, an amendment was brought forward for the purpose of excepting from the application of the law (prohibiting more than one pension being received by any one individual) certain cases of pensions formerly granted, which included the pension given to *Captain Pource*, for having (as alleged) when a grenadier, saved *Bonaparte* from assassination when he went to the Council of Five Hundred, on the 18th Brumaire. The discussion, with regard to this claim, now took a very curious turn. *M. Dupont (de l'Eure)*, who, at that period alluded to, was a member of the Council of Five Hundred, positively asserted that no attempt whatever was on that occasion made to assassinate *Bonaparte*; that the latter invented the story for the purpose of throwing odium upon the Members of the Council; and that *Pource* received his pension for attesting an attempt to assassinate, which was never made. This statement appears to have made a great impression upon the Chamber, who nearly unanimously rejected the proposed amendment. The discussion on the *Projet*, after lasting through the remainder of the Sitting, was again adjourned till Saturday.

The French Consul at Smyrna, who sent away *General Savary*, has been, it is said, recalled, and is to be succeeded by *M. David*, formerly Consul at Bucharest. It is also stated, that the *Marquis de Riviere*, the French Ambassador at Constantinople, is recalled, but his successor is not yet known. It is added, that nearly all the diplomatic agents in the Levant are to be changed. The *Marquis de la Tourdu Pin*, is, it is likewise said, to be recalled from the Netherlands, and to be succeeded by the *Marquis de Montelembert*. It appears to be certain, that *M. Hyde de Neuville*, the French Minister in the United States of America, is about to return.

It is said that the Count *Capo d'Istria* is on his way to London, to request some amelioration of the situation of the inhabitants of the Ionian Isles.

The King of Wurtemberg, it appears, still declines to assemble the states of his Kingdom.

The *Marquess de Ceralbo*, Grandee of Spain, had an audience of the King of Saxony, at Dresden, on the 10th inst. for the purpose of demanding for the Spanish Monarch the hand of the Princess *Josephine*, niece of the former sovereign. The requisite consent was formally given, and the Princess is to be at Madrid before *Michaelmas*.

The juvenile party given by the Prince Regent on Monday night to the children of the nobility and distinguished personages, was a very gratifying sight. His Royal Highness, to prevent them being kept out till a late hour, invited them to assemble at 9 o'clock; but some were so anxious to enjoy the honor of visiting the Prince Regent, and the pleasure of being at Carlton House, that they began to arrive there about half past eight. The pages and other gentlemen of the royal household appeared in their state uniforms upon the occasion. The entertainment was given in the lower suite of rooms, which were decorated and refreshed with plants, shrubs and flowers, as was the conservatory. The whole was remarkably cool, by all the windows being open, but to guard against any danger from drafts or cold wind, they had tight blinds. In the conservatory was stationed a numerous and well selected band of first rate performers, ably led by Mr. *Payne*. Dancing commenced with a country dance to the tune of "Gang na mair to yon town," which was followed by "Rob Roy." After this the juvenile party commenced Quadrilles. Refreshments were provided for them in a temporary room, the roof of which resembled a large Temple in the garden; access to it was made through a
