On the duration of Polls, when their natural position is reversed.

On removing the old fence of my garden, to set a new one about five years since, I found that the old fence was supported by a few polls that were forked, and the fork down, and that they were quite sound, while the rest were rotten and broken off. The yard fence (only five panels) three parts of which were strong and sound, and likely to last for ten years more, were not forked, but from their being knotty, it was easy to see that they were top in the ground. I have made enquiry of the carpenter who built the fence and he says the fence stood twenty or twenty-one years, and that it was the design of my predecessor to turn all polls top down, that would admit of it, the fact being known to him that they would last longer.

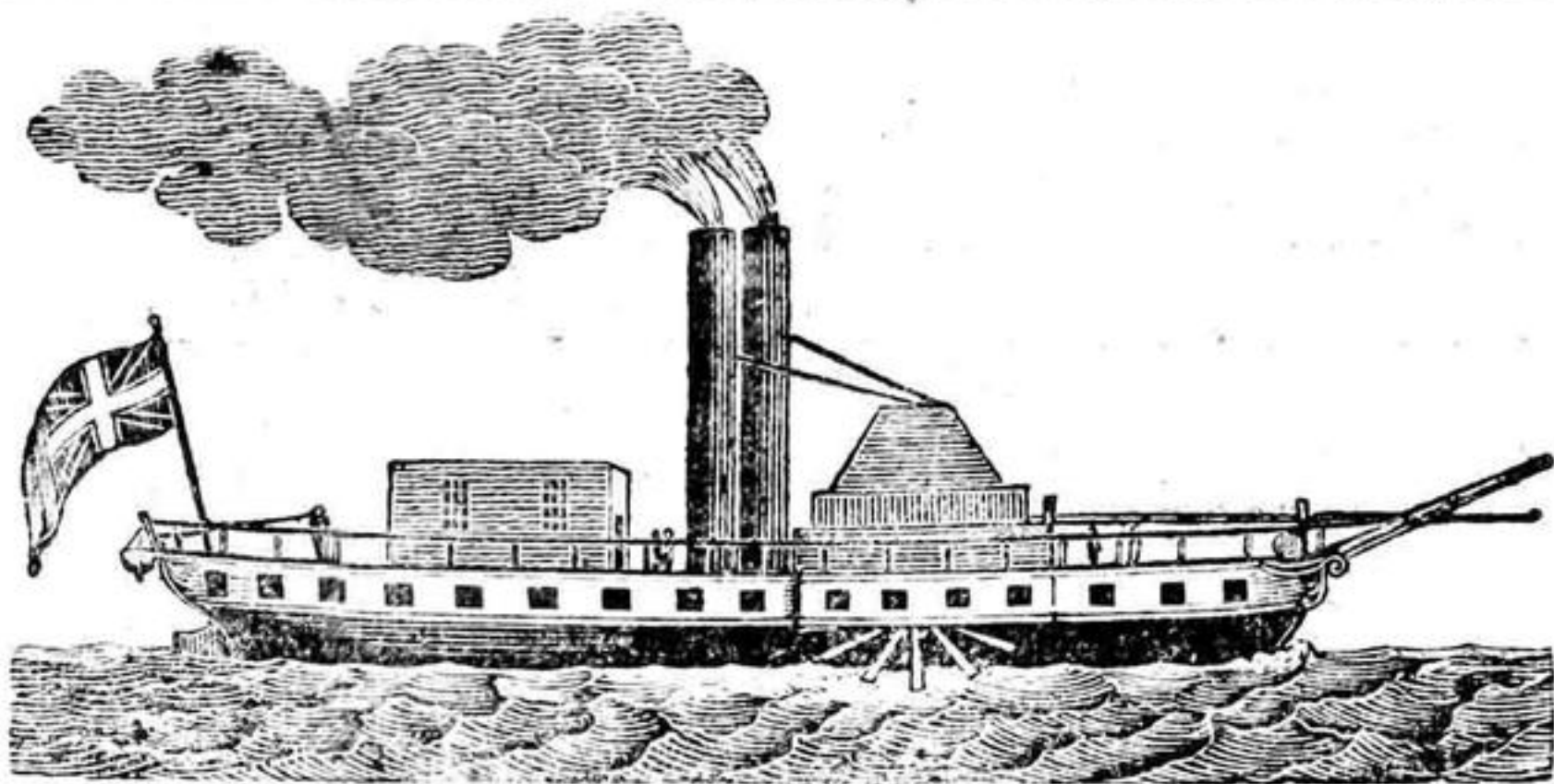
