FROM THE AMERICAN FARMER.

On the Art of making and bottling Gider. Elmwood, Oct. 25, 1819. Mr SKINNER, - A glass of good older

now sparkling before me, brings to my mind your request, to be informed of the best method to bottle cider. I have had the fatisfaction to furnish my table for eighteen years with that article, without any material interruption, having fome always of two years bottling on hand.

It would be needless to detail all the experiments I made to fave my bottles ; however, I will relate two that were very promiting, which will thew that nothing less than raising the proof of the cider will aniwer.

Experiment 1. I bottled eider of fine quaity in February with the best of corks, and removed it to the cellar; after the bottles were filled, they were placed in tubs of warm water, and raifed to full fummer heat, and then corked.

Experiment 2. Confidering that good corks would begin to ftop the air in the neck of the bottle, before they were haif driven in, and that a portion of air would be condenfed, and therefore greatly endanger the bottles, when the temperature was increased I procured perforated corks and llopped the perforations, after they were driven in, with pegs, and fealed

all over. Neither of these probable experiments were effectual; every hot day was announced by an explosion in the cellar. Giving over every ftratagem, that had not an alter ation of the liquor in view, it occurred to me that wines did not burft their bottles, and that cider was only a low wine, and also recollecting that small beer was both the weakest and most violently fermentative of all common drinks, I refolved to raile the proof of my cider, by the addition of two tea-spoons of French Brandy to each bottle. Since which I have had no more explosions nor broken bottles, and the eider is improved by the addition. Plumbs or honey, fo much used, must open and to the amount of 75 Dollars or have the same effect, i. e. to raise the proof; for it is only necessary to add a large cotton Shawls, one remarkable Folarger quantity of either to make eider reign red Scarf, upwards of four yards in into good wine, that will flash in the fire; | length, one end of which richly ornamenmy method is to get cider made late in October or November, from Redstreaks, Catalins or Maidensbluth. In December I put half an ounce of ininglass to each thirty gallons, and bottle it in February. If the itinglass is put in later, it will deposit

fome sediment in the bottles. It is to be

diffolved by chipping it into fine pieces,

and placing it in a covered mug with a quart of cider for ten hours or more, in a very warm ashes heat, about as much as we afe to draw tea-a little fealding of the corks, at the moment they are to be used, will soften them, so that they will fit better and be more readily driven in.

But it would be needless to expect cider to be made good by bottling, it must be pure and well flavored whilst in the cask; and therefore the subject necessarily involves cider making, on which you have many excellent papers. From what I understand of the making of eider, it appears that the later the apples hang on the trees the more powerful will be the cider; hence the cider of France and other temperate countries is faid to be more powerful than ours; our fummer apples, therefore, would not make good cider for bottling, because of their quickly arriving at perfection.

The cleaning of the liquor from the pumice is the main thing, when good found late apples are used. It appears that eider made from sweet apples is much more apt to abound with pumice, whilst the acid and afcerb retain their pumice in the press, hence fome very bad eating apples make excellent cider. The attention to this subject, i. e. the defacation, is all important, especially the first separation for if the first is well timed and complete, the future fermentations will be moderate and the racking effectual. Blankets have been used with success to get off much of the punice; they should be spread on the bottom of a flat basket, and that placed on the head of the calk. All strainers will require often washing out, and therefore two or three are necessary, all of which may be made from one ftout blanket. But I am fatisfied that a few hair fieves of different fincess, with the coarsest uppermost, placed under the run, would separate great quantities of pumice; they would also require shifting with a second fet, and constant attendance to wash them out; the fize of grainy fifters would answer. after thefe the blanket (trainer would reader the cider so pure, that the fermentation would be gentle and eafily managed for racking, so that the first racking and the ifinglass would finish the fining.
