To the Editors of the Kingston Chronicle-

GENTLEMEN,
Please give the inclosed printed poem, and the following remarks, a place in your paper, and oblige one of your constant readers.

The other day a friend of mine put into my hands a number of the Gleaner, published at Niagara, requesting my attention to a little poem in it, entitled, "The Negro's Soliloquy." Having the strongest repugnance to every thing connected with slavery, I quickly began its contents. It being apparently original, I did not expect to find any thing very interesting;—but how was I disappointed, when, ere I was half through it, every feeling of humanity was awakened—every tender sympathy of the heart called forth by the poor Negro's sad picture of slavery—his strong appeal to his christian master—the poignancy of his grief at the recollection of his former happiness in the society of his Zilla—his babes—his parents—his friends, contrasted with his present deplorable condition and this complaint, that his cruel oppressors tell him they are the servants of a God of Justice and Mercy!—Nature demanded her tribute, and I was forced to lay down the paper, while the tears of humanity bore ample testimony to the power of the poet in so forcibly appealing to the heart. I gave it a second, third, and fourth reading, and still found it rise in my estimation:—Nor do I hesitate to say I think it would do honor to the pen of an abler poet.

These two lines,
Where scorching eyes shall not behold my tears,
Nor mock my sufferings with insulting stare.
I conceive to be highly expressive of that kind of delicacy which a person in distress feels when in the presence of those who are not his friends; while they are couched in language strong and nervous. The six stanzas following these words, Till then, blest freedom, &c.

I think beautifully descriptive of the scenery the author aims to paint:—But who will deny the force of the succeeding ones, where he makes the slave advert, in all the tortures of agonizing recollection, to his happy condition while free in his native country, with his wife by his side,—his prattling babes climbing his knees,—and his appeal to the Christian, asking if he should not "love them with a father's love"?—And where is the bosom that ever dilated with the hallowed fire of love, that can read unmoved these lines—

Of as I witness those whom love has blest,
In sweet enjoyment by each other's side,
My tort'rd heart chinks in my dying breast!—
Remembrance calls to mind my own lov'd
bride!
My bride! my babes!—
And what christian can read this stanza,
The Christians say their God, &c.
and the two which follow it, and not blush that the followers of Jesus Christ have so long been justly stigmatized with iniquitously holding so many of their fellow mortals in the ignominious chains of slavery!

The author of the poem in question is about to give the public a volume of original poems. If they are all as interesting as "the Negro's Soliloquy," I heartily wish him every encouragement from his countrymen;—for I learn he is an Upper Canadian. I am informed by a gentleman from the Gore District, who is acquainted with the young man, that he never had any education, and that he has not even any knowledge of English Grammar, always having procured the means of subsistence by the labour of his hands:—and now, being in a bad state of health, is endeavouring to make his muse contribute to his support. He has sent subscription papers for his book to various parts of the Province; and I should be highly gratified to see them well filled with subscribers' names, and "Erius" (for such seems to be his public name) rewarded by the general suffrages of his countrymen.
