From the London Observer.

LOVE'S LAST SHIFT.

The following ludicrous affair took place yesterday at the police office, Bow-street:—In the midst of the ordinary business of the day, a most superb young Irishman, calling himself Mr. John Sullivan, solicited the private ear of the magistrate on business of importance. He was attired in the very pink of the mode; and, like Saul, the son of Kish, "from his shoulders and upwards, he was higher than all the people." The magistrate (R. Birnie, Esq.) impressed by his "gallant bearing," very politely withdrew with him into the library, and, though their conference was a short one, the result was the immediate issue of warrants for the apprehension of two ladies, the one a respectable housekeeper named Trim, residing in the neighbourhood of Piccadilly, & the other a Miss Mary Sullivan, a lodger in the house of the former. Limbrick was charged with the execution of these warrants, and he shortly returned to the office with his fair prisoners in a hackney coach. They were instantly placed before the magistrate, and Mr. John Sullivan "being first duly sworn," deposed, with an air of vast importance, to the following effect: he had formerly been thrown, by fortuitous circumstances, as an inmate in the same family with the prisoner, Miss Sullivan; and he had been unfortunate enough to form a connection of a tender nature with her, the issue of which tenderness had been two fine children. These children he had amply provided for, and in like manner he had provided for Miss Sullivan also, till she became so excessively importunate in her claims, and so immensely irregular in her habits, that he was compelled, "though that her jessies were his dear heartstrings, to whistle her off, and let her down the wind, to prey on fortune." He then established himself in separate apartments, but he was scarcely settled before Miss Sullivan forcibly joined him. He removed from lodging to lodging, but still the lady followed him like his shadow. All his endeavors to shake her off were unavailing, and she took frequent opportunities of robbing him. At length, on Thursday last, wearied and disgusted, he procured a suite of apartments in a distant part of the town; and removed to them so privately that he thought himself perfectly secure; but (alas! the vanity of human foresight!) the very first time he ventured from home the indefatigable Miss Sullivan procured admission to his rooms and took his entire wardrobe by storm! carrying off without remorse the whole of his "personals," viz. 6 waist coats, 3 pair of pantaloons, 2 shirts, one pair of stays (a little the worse for wear,) one pair of boots, with cravats, false collars, and wristbands almost ad infinitum. She was accompanied in this depredation by some person at present unknown to him; but the whole of the property, he understood was carried to the house of the other prisoner, Mrs. Trim, and he thought she might be indicted as the receiver. A coup de main like this, he observed, was too bad, and being determined to stand it no longer, he now confidently appealed to the laws of his country, trusting that they would interpose their authority to enforce the restoration of his property, and rid him effectually of that intolerable nuisance, Miss Mary Sullivan.

Miss Mary Sullivan, a broad-set, sturdy, middle aged woman, of ordinary features, vulgar dress, and most intense Irish brogue, listened to this narration with excessive impatience, responding to almost every sentence.—"Och! Jerry, my dear, why will you say that! Come out of the lying, Jerry dear, and give us the truth of it!" whilst the venerable Mrs. Trim, a very respectable looking old gentlewoman, lifted her hands and eyes in silent vexation, and the magistrate growing more and more impatient every moment, repeatedly eyed the lofty narrator with astonishment, mingled, as we thought, with a little disgust.

Miss Mary Sullivan, however, had now an opportunity of replying to her false-hearted paramour, and she burst forth in a strain of sarcasm, delivered with such a precision and a plumb, that it appeared absolutely to sultry him. She told, in a voice which seemed to shake the very walls of the room, how he had practised on her tender innocence; how she had, nevertheless, been a true and faithful wife to him for upwards of six years, and had been the mother of his two children; how one of those children had been charitably maintained by a relative of her own, and the other consigned to the parish workhouse; how she had supported him by her manes and her labour, when he had not a thirteen to bless himself with; how she had repeatedly clothed him from top to toe; how he had been arrested by Mrs. Tim for £15 "for rent of the place,"—lay nine months in the Marshalsea prison,—and was at length liberated by that lady, on his humble petition to her; how, on regaining his liberty, he was ten times more idle than before, and deserting her, his poor countrywoman and relative, who had devoted her whole life to him, he had become fancy gentleman to one half the English
