Extracts from London papers.

THE STATE OF THE S

Present from the King of Prussia to the Duke of Wellington.

The finest service of china ever imported into this kingdon, arrived from Hamburgh on the 15th, as a present from the King of Prussia to the Duke of Wellington. On Tuesday last the same was escorted to Apfley House, by a party of officers belonging to the Customs, attended by three Pruffian Officers. Tuesday a proportion of these glittering ornaments were fet out in the great banquetting room, for the inspection of the Duke and his friends. In the centre of a most superb plateau, enriched with exquifite or molu, appeared a triumphal column (an obelifk) containing an infcription, giving a flight outline of the gallant achievements. Magnificent vales, pedestals, and figures; tureens, ice pails, plates, &c. all detailing the numerous exploits of British valor. One piece reprefents the Duke mounted on this while charger. Every article is supperbly gilt with maffy gold, intermixed with garter blue, white and red colors. Every plate is different, containing figures, landscapes, or public edifices in Spain, Portugal, &c. Flags and other military infignia, appear in appropriate fituations. The paintings are matchless, being the combined works of the artifts of almost every country.

Court of King's Bench, Friday Dec. 10. A cause was tried, in which Mr. Macironi, an agent of the unfortunate Murat, was the plaintiff, against the publisher of the Quarterly Review, for an alleged libel in that work, imputing dishonorable conduct to that gentleman, in a transaction between Murat and the allies, - Verdict for the defendant.

Another cause for libel was tried, in which a Mr. Wright was plaintiff, against the publisher of Cobbett's Register, for a libel imputing to the plaintiff the crime of forging, and other difgraceful acts. Verdict for the plaintiff-Damages £500.

A Danish Translation of the New Testament, has lately been completed, and presented to the Royal Chancery. It has received the approbation of the King, who has authorifed the printing of an edition of ten thousand copies. The Bible Society of Holland is now printing an edition of the Bible, on stereotype plates, presented to it by the British and Foreign Bible Society.

A Savings Bank has been established at Botany Bay.

The Worchester Journal states that Captain Baines, the receiving officer of that diftrict, has inspected 800 of the outpenfioners who had been ordered by the British government to appear and enroll themselves. Those unfit for duty were dismissed. The others were marched to Plymouth. Six hundred of out-pensioners who had not appeared in time to enroll themselves have been struck from the pension lift.

The Radicals of Bolton, in Lancashire, have burnt Hunt in effigy, on suspicion of

his being a fpy. At a late fair in England, three watches were stolen .- All means to discover the thief were ineffectual. A few days afterwards a stranger having stopped at a !

public house in the town, in a few minutes an eruption of a blood vessel caused his immediate death. On examining his p-rion, the loft property was found.

One of the corporals in the Coldstream regiment of guards, for improper conduct in opening letters which passed through his hands belonging to his comrades was drummed out of the regiment. A rope with a noofe was placed round his neck, and he was led between two drummers with the rest of the drummers beating the Rogues' March behind him. Having been difmissed, he instantly put Hunt's colors in his cap, and gave three cheers, calling out, " Hunt for ever."

There has been a very awful wreck on the Kivors. A fine West Indiaman, very large and valuable, named Demerara, from Demerara to Liverpool, struck on the night of the 16th, and almost immediately went to pieces. Twenty of her crew were buried in one grave on Saturday, at Collens' town, and two more on Sunday, not one faved that we know of !-

Dublin Gaz. The two Indiamen recently lost off the Cape of Good Hope, were insured at Lloyd's for £100,000.

King Robert Bruce.

Dunfermline, Nov. 12. There was found on the 10th instant. among the rubbish around the grave of King Robert Bruce, of the reinterment of whose body on the Friday preceding, an account was given in last Monday's Courant, a copper-plate, four inches wide, and five and three-eighth inches long, having inscribed on it a Crown, and the letters " Robertus Scotorum Rex," with a Cross embracing, within the angles, four raffles, each with five points. This discovery is most important, being all that was wanted to completely diffipate the doubts that itill lurked in the breaks of many who were not fatisfied with the existing historical accounts, that the body, about which fo much has been faid, was that of the Revered Affertor of Scottish Independence.

Governor Mair, of Fort George, in Scotland, has obtained the permission of the Duke of York, to have the Prince of Saxe Cobourg inscribed upon the ravelins of Fort George, that Prince having visited said fortress in the course of his tour in Scotland. Fort George is the only regular fortress in Great Britain, and its various bastions are named after the fons of his Majesty. And now the ravelins, which were the only part of the fortress without a name engraven on them, have that of the Prince Leopold, and are now " His Royal Highness Prince Leopold of Saxe Cobourg's ravelins."

A jolly radical, reeling through Leeds, in a state of intoxication, attracted particular notice, from the appropriate inscription in the front of his hat :- " Reformation or Ruination!"
