VACCINATION.

[CONCLUDED.]

It appears to me, that from a fair conclusion of those numerous experiments, we may clearly infer a belief, that ought to produce a strong conviction on every candid mind, that vaccination did in those instances prove an actual substitute for variola. The plain fact seems to be this, that the question has been handled in too loose and hypothetical a manner by the opposers of vaccination to be decidedly relied on. They did, at first, universally attempt to arrive at the truth by a mere dint of theorising; but as the judgment of medical gentlemen ever have & probably will still continue so far variant, as to draw different conclusions from the same causes, and also theoretically to deduce different causes from similar effects, we need not be surprised that they should fall into various opinions on the subject: therefore being unable to arrive at the focus of pathological facts, (theorising from effects to causes,) and unable to develop the true principles, which were not only new, but also extremely obscure and difficult to investigate;—and to this, their ignorance of the peculiar mode of action excited in the system by vaccine infection, and also of the cause of such effects, as, simply existing in the matter inserted, or how the effects were chemically varied by being brought into combination with the system, and we shall not, I say, be left to wonder why they arrived at errors.—The true causes why vaccination might be considered a preventative against variola, was formerly unknown to the medical world, except by analogical reasoning, and probably still remains so to a considerable proportion, even to this day. But if there are any, (and it is presumed there are) who, by the assistance of modern discoveries, aided by their own researches to acquire knowledge, have arrived at the true theory of the subject, mankind would, probably, have been made acquainted with the result of their investigations, had they been unfavourable to vaccination. But instead of this we find the whole strength of their opposition to be grounded on the old argument, (viz.) that it has in some instances been known to fail of acting as an effectual preventative: still having no reference to the genuine or spurious principles of the matter employed. Now that vaccine, as well as variolous matter, may, and actually does, become vitiated, spurious, and even inert, from various causes, is a fact indubitably established: for instance, we have the best authority to say, that variolous matter becomes both vitiated and destroyed by being combined with the contagious matter of the plague, and also that vaccine matter becomes spurious, and completely nugatory, by repeatedly and successively passing from one diseased habit to another, as has been shown by the experiments before related. This variation of quality in the matter, the argus eyes of strict observers have distinctly marked, and hence have acquired the knowledge of determining, by its effects from the fifth until the eleventh day, whether the small pox will take effect or not.

The opposers, however, appear to have overlooked these observations, and still adhere to their former argument; which only appears to prove the spurious quality of the matter used, and no more shows the inefficacy of vaccination, as a preventative of variola, than variolous infection is shown not to be an antidote against itself; for several persons have been known to have had the small pox twice. Therefore, if the small pox has sometimes been known to affect persons after vaccination, it no more proves its non-efficacy as a preventative than the second appearance of variola (small pox) proves its inefficacy as a preventative against itself. Hence if we suffer ourselves to adopt the method of our opponents, we not only reason falsely, but ungenerously. In a medical point of view it is extremely unsafe to attempt to ascertain unknown causes from known effects, as by such unhappy methods of theorising we are liable to fall into erroneous conclusions, much to the expense of the suffering victims of disease.

The next objection to vaccination as a preventative of the small pox, appears to be, that it is only a temporary remedy. This idea has been introduced, and pretentiously supported by those, who appear not to understand the true mode in which contagion acts upon the system; and who consequently possessed an opinion that there existed in the animal economy, a certain predisposition to variola, which could not be brought into general action, unless solicited by certain exciting causes, one of which they acknowledge to be vaccination; and also that it does, for a certain time, either reduce or destroy this predisposition to small pox. But it seems incorrect to admit, that this predisposition is so far destroyed by vaccination as to free the system from any liability to the small pox for a time, and should still not be so far destroyed as to prevent its future regeneration. It is a plain fact, that, if it prevents the small pox, a day,—a month—a year, or seven years—the predisposition must be so far
