About 50 years ago Elizabeth Blanch, who kept a public house in Sunderland, a sea-port town of England, having missed a sum of money, which she kept in an unlocked drawer in her store, accused a person of the name of Joseph Humphrey's, a boatman, of the theft.

Sometime after, a sailor, on his return from a long voyage, fell sick at Plymouth, and having learnt the fate of Humphrey's he made a full and satisfactory confession of the robbery, which was published at the time in all the newspapers.

At one of the provincial assizes in England a gentleman was tried and convicted, upon circumstantial evidence, of the murder of his niece.

Near twelve months after, the niece, who had eloped, arrived in England, and elucidated the whole transaction. It appeared that she had formed an attachment for a person whom her uncle disapproved of.

KINGSTON, July 7, 1820.

Our latest dates from England this week, are to the 15th May.—France appears to be in an agitated state, though the accounts are attempts to assassinate the Royal Family, &c.

A debate of some importance has taken place in the British Parliament, on the present system of commercial policy, in the course of which, it was variously admitted, that restrictions on foreign trade, were injurious to the prosperity of the Country.

The election for the Counties of Durham and Northumberland were at length on Monday last—at the close of which day the Poll stood as follows for Northumberland.

ELECTIONS.

On Monday last the election for the County of Frontenac was held near the Court House. The writ having been read by William Mitchell, Esquire, the Returning Officer, two candidates presented themselves, viz. Allan MacLean, Esquire, and Mr. Anthony McGuin.

Mr. MacLean was consequently declared duly elected. We congratulate our fellow electors on the return of the Gentleman as our Representative, to Parliament, where he was, during two successive terms, called the Chief of Speakers with honour to himself and his constituents, and with advantage to the Province at large.

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Mr. GOURLAY.

The Niagara Argus of 22nd June contains a letter written by this almost forgotten personage, addressed to the Editors of all British Newspapers, and published at Dundee in March last. Mr. Gourlay commences by pointing out the ignorance of the British people on Canadian affairs; he states the peaceable object of his visit to the Upper Province, glosses over the reasons which induced him to form a convention and prepare a petition for Parliamentary enquiry, and after remarking on the passing of the seditious meetings Bill, and his own lamentable imprisonment and banishment under the authority of the 4th George 3d, he declares his intention to lay his case before the King and Imperial Parliament.

The weather for some time has been very sultry and oppressive—the Thermometer ranging for the last fortnight between 78° and 90° degrees in the shade at mid-day.

The want of rain is greatly felt, as none has fallen within the last three weeks—In consequence of this unusually long drought, the gardens are parched, and the vegetables are withering under the heat of a glowing sun—The meadows also are suffering—and hay in this vicinity will be far from abundant.

Fires.

The Albany Gazette gives an account of a destructive fire having broke out in the town of Troy, in the state of New-York on the 30th June, by which one hundred and twenty houses were destroyed.—The loss of property is estimated at one Million Dollars.

The New-York papers state that on the 22d June, between thirty and forty houses were consumed in that city by a fire which originated in a distillery, situated in the rear of Broadway.—The loss is supposed to be about Seventy thousand Dollars.
