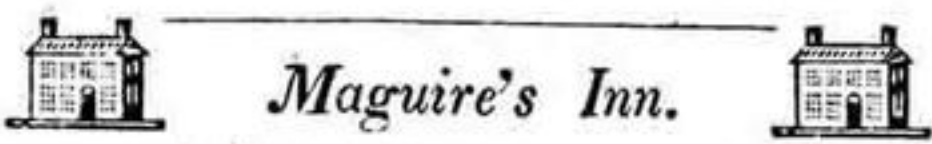

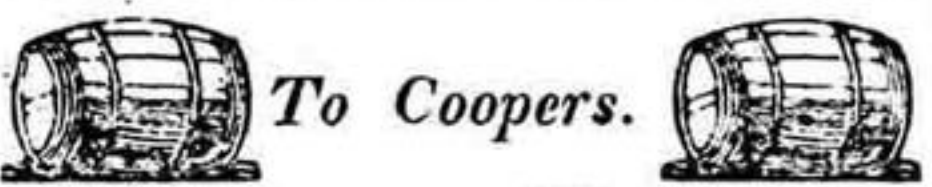

[FROM THE JOHN BULL.]
EDWARD G. WAKEFIELD AND
MISS TURNER.

CONTINUED.

It may be asked—if I had found her ugly, ignorant, and vulgar, as she had once been described to me, what should I have done? My mind was quite made up. I should have taken her back to Liverpool, desire the school-mistress to send immediately for Mr. Turner, and should have left with her, for him, a partial account of my freak—urging him to conceal it for his child's sake. I had not mentioned marriage to her. As my motives for taking her back would never have been suspected, so my motives for taking her away would never have been discovered. I intended to refuse all explanation upon the subject beyond admitting an act of seeming folly, and in part describing, what would have been considered an unfathomable mystery. I trusted to Mr. Turner's good sense to keep the secret. At all events, that was my intention.

If she had felt alarmed, and had objected to travelling with me, I should have made for Buxton, and should have sent her home with the landlady of the Buxton Hotel. But, instead of having to fulfil either of these intentions, every thing conspired to confirm my main resolution.

No one can imagine the pains I took to know my future wife—and, finding her, as I did, all that is delightful, how I strove to interest her, and to make her pleased with me. That I succeeded there can be no doubt: for when, having made up my mind to propose marriage to her, I asked her whether she knew where she was going? She said, "No, but I suppose you do?" and I do not wish to be told. I rather enjoy the uncertainty."
