



For the information of persons arriving in Upper Canada, as settle's, the following summary of the rules which His Majesty's Government has thought fit to lay down for the fu ture regulation of grants of land in the Province, in conformity to the system which has been recently adopted with respect to other Colonies of His Majesty, has been prepared in conformity to instructions from Earl Bathurst.

. . . valuation will be forthwith made of the lands throughout the Colony, and average prices willbbe struck for meh District.

2, All the lands in the Colony not hitherto granted, and appropriated for pul . Burposes, 20th Sept. 1826. will be offered for sale at the average prices thus

3, All persons proposing to purchase lands must transmit a written application to the Government through the office of the Seeyor General, in a certain prescribed form, which will be delivered to the party applying by me Sorveyor General, or by an officer to be appointed by him for that purpose, in the several Districts, on payment of a ice of 2s. 6d.

4. All correspondence with the Government respecting grants of land, must take place through the same office.

5. The purchase maney is to be paid by four quarterly, or five annual instalments as the party applying may desire, but in the latter case legal interest shall be charged, and shall be payable Frederick. annually from the time of making the agreement -a discount of 10 per cent, will be allowed for ready money payments,

6. On payment of the money a grant will be made in fee simple to the purchaser at the expense of the Crown, with the usual reservations of mines, minerals, and of white pine timber.

7. The largest quantity of land which will be Kingston, 6th Oct. 1826. sold to any individual, is 10,000 acres, and when put up to sale, it will be offered in such tracts, not less than 100 acres, as may be directed. Persons wishing more extensive purchases must apply, in writing, through the Lieutenant Governor in council, to His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, with full explanations of their objects and means.

13. The quit rent will be redeemable within the tirst 25 years next tollowing the grant, on payment of a sum equal to twenty times the annual


