IV, cap. 13, more particularly with respect to importing and warehousing American Flour for exportation to the West-Indies, as it is required that the duties should be paid on goods brought in the Province by inland navigation on the arrival at the Frontier Ports through which they most of necessity pass before they can arrive at a warehousing Port.

Sir,—It having been represented to the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, that the Merchants of Canada have not been able to avail themselves of the benefits which it was intended to confer on their trade by the acts of 6th Geo. 4th, cap. 114, and 7th Geo. 4th, cap. 43, more particularly with respect to the importing and warehousing American flour for exportation to the West Indies, as it is required that the duties should be paid on goods brought into the Province by inland navigation on their arrival at the frontier ports through which they must of necessity pass before they can arrive at a warehousing Port; and it being their Lordship's intention to propose some measures, with a view to the removal of this impediment, I am directed to request you will move the Lords of his Majesty's Treasury to direct the Commissioners of his Majesty's Customs to acquit their officers in both the Canadas, that all goods which may lawfully be imported by land or inland navigation, should be permitted to enter at the Ports of entry, upon security to the satisfaction of the Collector of the Customs for the due delivery thereof at some free warehousing port in one of the Provinces.

THE RIDEAU CANAL.—On Tuesday last at one o'clock, the Kingston section of this great undertaking was commenced; ground was broke at the foot of Talle's Hill, within four miles of the town. We regret that the wetness of the day prevented many of our inhabitants witnessing a scene at once so interesting and important. We shall have much pleasure in notifying from time to time the progress of the work.

On the 16th instant the first division of the 76th Regiment arrived at Quebec from Montreal, under the command of Captain Aethering. And on the 17th, the Head Quarter division of the 71st Highland Light Infantry, under Colonel Jones, left Quebec for Montreal, to relieve the remaining division of the 76th Regt. under Major Stevenson.

The Weather during the early part of this week has been rainy and favorable to the vegetation. The glass, since our last publication, has ranged from 58° to 72° at noon, in the shade.

The Asia being the first tea ship for the season for Canada, arrived at Quebec on the 16th instant, in 124 days from Canton.

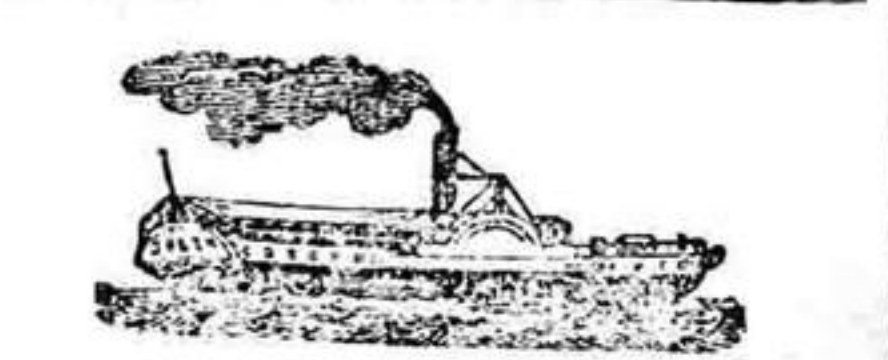
