May it please your Lordship;

WE the undersigned inhabitants of Cobourg and its vicinity, members, adherents, and friends, of the Church of England, avail ourselves of the opportunity afforded by your Lordship's first pastoral visitation to this district, to offer our sincere congratulations to your Lordship on your elevation to a station where your well known piety and zeal cannot but add increased success to the cause which has heretofore so warmly engaged your Lordship's interests and exertions.

nicle, the Herald, and the Gazette, several communications, signed "Philomath," "Rohem Jeffers," &c. respecting the measurement of hoppers of different dimensions, I send for your insertion a rule, by which may be found the area of the top of any hopper, that is, the area of the base of the frustum of any regular pyramid, whether circular, triangular, square, rectangular, or polygonal.

Rule.-Divide the solid content of the frustum by 1.3 of its perpendicular height; from the quotient subtract 3 of the area of the less end; extract the square root of the remainder; and from the root subtract one half of the square root of the less end. The square of the number thus found will be the area of the greater end.

This rule is deduced from the 108th. 114th, and 115th, Theorems of Hutton's Geometry, or the 7th Theorem of the 12th Euclid, and from the Formula for solving Quadratic Equations.
