ASSESSMENT LAW.—After this day the wild lands within this Province, in all cases where the Rates or Taxes have been suffered to run or be in arrear for the space of eight years, are liable to be sold by the Sheriff, he first giving six months notice of the time and place of sale. It is proper to inform the public that all taxes now in arrear for the space of six years must be paid to the Treasurer of the District in which the lands are situated; but in cases where the six years have not expired, the taxes may be paid, on any lands within the Province, to the Treasurer of the District in which the proprietor resides.
