

We learn from the last London paper received, that notice has been given that the Four per Cent. Stock is to be reduced to three and a half, and redeemable at the option of the Government in ten years. We are not exactly aware what amount of saving will be effected by this operation.

Celebration of His Majesty's Birth Day.—Yesterday being St. George's day, and the one appointed to commemorate the birth of our most Gracious Sovereign, the troops in the Garrison paraded in front of the Market Square. The Artillery appeared to the best advantage in their new and beautiful uniform, and fired a royal salute in capital style. Our gallant countrymen, the 79th, never looked better, displaying the first time for the season, their martial, and picturesque garb; a sight, after a long and severe winter, particularly to eyes like ours, unusually cheering, and which we hail as a certain harbinger of spring. They fired a *feu de joie* with admirable precision. We perceived with much pleasure that a part of the Frontenac Militia Cavalry joined the regular troops, in doing honor to the day.

At one o'clock a Royal Salute was fired from the *Cockburn*, which was moored in front of the residence of the Hon. Captain Byng.

Dalhousie April 7th, 1830.
I'm born, O'Patie, to a thrawt fate,
I'm born to strive wih' hardships sad and great."
To the Editor of the *Examiner*.
DEAR SIR—I had a peculiar share of the distress that prevailed the mother country, before we left it. I was in my boyhood; and in this land of comfort, my wife has had the misfortune to lose her eye-sight, and I had my leg broken, &c. &c. &c. I am well schuld' in adversity—

"I've been pair and vex'd and raggy,
Try't wih' troubles no that em'a,
A' them boir, but this misfortune
Lays the cape stane o' them a'."

On Monday morning last, whilst at work in the field, I heard a cry of distress issuing from my dwelling house: I hastened to the spot, and my feelings may be conceived, but not described, when I saw my house on fire, and my wife (who has a tender constitution, and who had been bed-ridden for some time,) groping her way from the conflagration, in a state of nudity, shrieking for help, being almost frantic with anxiety for the fate of her helpless children whom she could not see; but who were safe. In attempting to save my all, I got myself burned and severely hurt by a fall, which rendered me unfit for any further exertion. At this juncture a neighbour fortunately arrived, and was the means of saving some things, but the morning was fine, and a dry breeze soon made it dangerous to enter the house; and then we could only be idle spectators. Our bodily clothes, the most of my implements, seed grain, and nearly 100 bushels of Potatoes in the cellar, and a great quantity of our summer provisions were consumed to ashes.

When I looked on the ruins and saw my poor blind wife and helpless children "wih' no house to put their head in," I was almost ready to say with our departed countryman Robert Burns, when a similar mishap befell him, "my situation is not to be envied by those who have received the mitemus of 'depart from me ye cursed.'"
