It is rather a singular phenomenon in the economy of nature, that the island of Java should produce at the same time the Mangosteen, the most mellow and luscious of fruits, and the deadly Upas, the most malignant of poisons. In the journal of a botanist, lately deceased, when Napoleon sent to Java in 1810, to make collections of plants for the imperial garden at St. Cloud, we find the substance of the following facts, which we present to our readers. The poison is a gum, which, like the camphor, issues from the bark .-Malefactors under the sentence of death, are the only persons who are compelled to gather this deadly and baleful gum. The ministers of the native sovereign provide them with a tortoise shell box, in which they are to put the pestiferous gum. These devoted criminals then proceed to the house of the old priest, where they remain until the wind blows in a favourable direction so as to bear the effluvia from them. As woon as the desired breeze arises, the priest prepares them for their approaching fate. At the moment of departure, the priest puts on them a long leather cap, with two glasses before their eyes, which comes down to the breast. Thus equiped, they set out on a journey to that fatal " bourne' from which but few travellers return. The old ecclesiastic assured our traveller, that during a residence of thirty years on this great thoroughfare of death, he had witnessed the departure to the Upas of more than eight hundred unhappy beings, out of whom not more than thirty ever returned. Those who escaped the dreadful influence of the Upas, described it as a middling sized tree, decorated with branches of the most vivid verdure. It broods sullenly over a rivulet, as a landmark of vegetation, in the barren vale of wilderness, over which it waves its poisoned foliage.

MODE OF PLANTING, The grape vine is propagated either from a slip, taken from the stem of health vines, of at least four or five years' growth or by trasplanting the roots themselves. By the first mode, it requires seven or eight years before the vine comes to its full bearing : and for the two first years, these plants which fail must be replaced ;-ahout one-third of the whole plantation. The second mode is the best; for, if you are supplied with good plants, well rooted. there is no danger of loosing any; and the second year from the time of transplanting,

In climates where the winters are severe, the season for transplanting the vine is the latter part of March, or the begining o April; but in more temperate latitudes, the end of October is to be preferred,

they yield fruit.

Drills, or furrows, of eighteen inches wide and eighteen deep, must first be prepared; and if they he made in the course of the preceding summer or autumn, would! He still better; for the earth thus having remained exposed to the air, would be more favourable to the plant. The most economical and expeditious way of performing his operation is by using a plough, and gong with it three or four times over the same furrow; after which the ground may 0 be dug out with a spade, to the depth required. If the plantation is but small, or the expense no consideration, the best method is to dig the ground deep with the spade, and turn it up in all directions.

In lands which are very sandy and light, the drills must be made to the depth of sixteen or eighteen inches, and the drier the 6 soil, the deeper they ought to be. In rich soils, fifteen inches is sufficient. Let the drills be run in a direct straight line from north to south, that the plants may receive the rays of the sun on all sides. Plant the roots from four to six feet apart, according to the quality of the soil, The richer it is, the farther apart the plants should be. If O you use horses for ploughing, the roots ought to be at least six or seven feet distant from one another, and eight or uine if oxes are used, so that your ground may be used without imuring any of the plants. Finally, if the spade only is to be used, the plants may be placed five or six feet apart every way; care must be taken, likewise, not to place the plants of one row immediately opposite those of he next row; that they may not he in the way of one another.

In planting the vine, lay down six inches of the plant flat, at the hottom of the drill, leaning the upper part of it against the side, so as to form the figure of an angle, when in this position, placing one foot on the roots to press them flat with the bottom of Ninth Concession of the Town four inches of good earth, well pulverised, or two or three handfulls of moistened ashes : you then press the clay or ashes closely with your feet, and fill up the drilles wis only to leave two eyes of the plant uncovered.
