siderably advanced his fortune. Pray
Heaven he may in time come even to
despise me.
There is occasion for a great deal
of resolution, as well as greatness of soul,
to refuse posts and employments, and
sit down contented with retirement, and
doing nothing. Few there are who
have merit enough to play this part
handsomely, or know how to pass their
leisure hours, without what the vulgar
call business. Yet there is nothing
wanting to the idleness of a wise man,
but a better name, and that his medita-
