

Tax arrival of the Napoleon, bringing London dates to the 24th, has enabled us to fill our columns with matter of the most interesting and important character that it perhaps has ever been your lot to lay before the public—the minority of His Majesty's Ministers upon the all-absorbing question of Reform, and the consequent dissolution of the Imperial Parliament. The bold, manly, & decisive step, adopted at this momentous crisis by His Majesty, must ever secure his popularity as a King, while it will afford an example to future monarchs, replete with instruction, when involved in similar circumstances.

It appears quite natural that considerable opposition would be shown to this bill by those who had purchased seats from boroughmongers.—Notwithstanding the example to the contrary exhibited in the conduct of Lord John Russell, Messrs. Peel, Stanley, and others; nor should the example of Sir Sandford Graham be omitted, who, by his vote on that question, deprived himself of the enormous sum of £25,000, the purchase of the representation of Ludgershall.

Poland seems to be carrying on her struggle with increased success, as will be seen by accounts in another part of our impression; whilst Ireland is now universally plunged into an abyss of anarchy, atrocity and moral turpitude, that the prospect of a general election is but badly calculated to redeem her from.

KINGSTON COMB FACTORY.—We have been guilty of great neglect in not having previously attracted the public attention to the enterprising spirit of Mr. Packard, who has added to the importance of our town by the establishment of a Comb Factory at the corner of Brock and Rear Streets, we believe the only establishment of the kind in either of the Provinces. We visited his factory a few evenings ago, and consider it not only a most useful appendage to the commerce of our town, but also most ingenious and scientific in the machinery made use of in the construction of these important articles of Ladies' attire. The horn and imitation combs can scarcely, from their elegance and clearness, be distinguished from the finest tortoise shell. Mr. Packard deserves every encouragement; and we cordially hope that the merchants of the town, and others employed in selling these articles, will give preference to a home manufactory, and thereby encourage the prosperity of our town, and the enterprising spirit of the proprietor. We recommend those who have never seen the skill required in the operation of *reducing, filing, splitting and preparing* the uncut material from which these elegant articles are manufactured, to visit this establishment.
