**Extract of a Letter from a Lady in London, May 12th, 1831.**

I saw the King and the whole of the royal family, at what is called the "private view" of the Exhibition of the Royal Academy. They were there almost three hours. There was an immense crowd outside, and we observed the Queen wipe a tear from her eye on hearing the loud acclamations with which her husband was greeted. She is by no means a handsome woman, and her eyes are remarkably light and prominent. She was dressed in white blue velvet, with a white chip bonnet and feathers. The princesses were habited nearly alike, in dark blue silk pelisses with bonnets of the same colour. They are all "stout ladies," and look like George the Fourth. The little Princess Victoria wore a light-coloured silk pelisse, with a cottage bonnet of Tuscan straw. The King was dressed in black and had his hair powdered. The President of the Academy, Sir Martin Arthur Shee, attended the Royal Family through the Exhibition. He was in full dress, and wore his gold medal and chain.

Mr. and Mrs. M'Lane have been lately at two balls at the palace, and describe them as very splendid.

The determined manner in which the King acted in dissolving the Parliament, has made him perhaps more popular than any British monarch that ever reigned.—When he ordered the state-coach to be prepared, word was brought to him that it would be impossible for him to dissolve Parliament on that day, as it would take twenty-four hours to plait the manes and tails of the horses. The King then desired a hack to be brought, as he was determined to go at once. However, the state-coach and horses were eventually put in order.

We have been asked by many English persons if we have heard of the compliment which our Minister paid to the King, in speaking of him a short time since. It seems that Mr. M'Lane said, "he had never supposed it possible he could be brought to envy a king, but he would almost rather have had the feelings of William, the Fourth on the day he dissolved Parliament, than those of any other man that has ever lived." The English appear much gratified at this opinion of their Sovereign, expressed by an American citizen.
