## FOREIGN ITEMS.

By arrivals in the United States.

[We sometimes find in the United States Journals short items of intelligence from their general commercial intercourse. These are by no means so frequent and so full as we might expect. The following extracts give the latest dates from the Mediterranean, &c.]

Pitcairn's Island .- Those who are familiar with the recent accounts of the prosperous condition of the descendants of the mutineers of the English Ship Bounty, will learn, perhaps with some surprise, that the whole number of them have emigrated from the island, on account of a deficiency of the necessary means of subsistence. Capt. Wilcox, of the whaling ship, Maria Theresa, arrived at this port yesterday, informs that while at Otaheite, the English transport ship Lucian narrived there with all the inhabitants of Pitcairn's Island, with the purpose of fixing them in a settlement at Otaheite, on account of a scarcity of water at the former island.
