

POLAND & RUSSIA.

The accounts from Poland are, as far as they go, cheering. The National Government had published a circular relative to the battle of Ostralenka, in which no disposition is manifested to disguise the loss they had sustained, but the amount is lower than was stated in the reports received by the late arrival.

By an official letter of Skrynecki to the national Government dated from Praga, June 2d., it appears that upon the very day when the troops under his immediate command, so gallantly resisted the immense superior numbers of Diebitsch, another corps of the Polish army were conducting with equal gallantry and better success in the neighborhood of Narawka.

The following is the article from the St. Petersburg Gazette, against which a remonstrance has been made by the French to the Russian Government.

"The future is impenetrable to our eye; but if it be true that all evils on earth are confined to certain bounds, and that the evitable hand which rules the world puts an end to them sooner or later, we think we perceive through the threatening gloom the first ray of this consolatory truth.

However great the destroying rage of the revolutionary scourge, which has been chastising Europe for these ten months may be, it is, perhaps, nearer being exhausted than we imagine.

not content with exciting the zeal of her partisans, she has pushed her care so far as to cause the gibbets to be erected before her and has herself presided at the executions. Instructions seized in several places upon some of the chiefs of these rebels, have arrived to confirm that which was foreseen of the simultaneousness of their measures, the uniformity of the means employed by them—means which, as may be seen, are so many crimes, that is to say— that these atrocities are committed under directions regulated from a system prepared elsewhere, with as much art as perfidy.

Advices bearing date the 6th of June, have reached town from Lubeck, stating that up to that date no symptoms of cholera had appeared; that the disease at Riga had been confined to a district separated from the city, where from the precautions taken the disease could not spread; that every possible precaution had been taken by the Board of Health; that rags had been prohibited to be imported into Lubeck.
