POLAND & RUSSIA.

The accounts from Poland are, as far as they go, cheering. The National Government had published a circular relative to the battle of Ostralenka, in which no disposition is manifested to disguise the loss they had sustained, but the amount is lower than was stated in the reports received by the late arrival. The loss of the late Polish army is said not to have exceeded two thousand. The army is reposing and reinforcing at Praga, whence the brave Skrzynecki issues his bulletins and circulars, expressed in language which breathes any thing but diminished confidence and courage. The loss on the Rnssian side at the battle of Ostralenka, is variously stated, and probably all the accounts are more or less exaggerated. A Berlin paper, speaking of the report which estimated it at 15,000, says.
