Again, when he contemplates still more attentively the thoughts, acts and passions of this his sentient, intelligent self, he finds indeed, that he can remember, and, by the aid of memory, can compare and discriminate, can judge and resolve; and, above all, that he is irresistibly compelled, from the preception of any phenomenon without or withtn him, to infer the existence of something prior, which stands to it in the relation of a cause, without which it would not be; and that this knowledge of causes and their consequences is what, in almost every instance, determines his choice and will, in cases where he is nevertheless conto acquire more or less knowledge of caus- mical Ink for that purpose. es and effects, according to the degrees of attention he bestows upon them, which attention is again, in great measure, a voluntary act; and often, when his choice has been decided on imperfect knowledge or insufficient attention, he finds reason to correct his judgement, though perhaps too late to influence his decision by after consideration. SMUT IN WHEAT.-A discovery has been made by A. Allen, a respectable farmer of this country, which we think may be important to farmers and therefore give it publicity. Mr. Alden gives it as his R. HAMILTON, pr. J. H. Steam-Boat Alciope. opinion, from experiments he has made, that smut is produced from small shrivelled kernels of wheat.
