Poles! Yet one moment more of endurance and resignation, and the end of the glorious contest, whose result will be the restoration of our freedom, independence and rights, is at hand. The scale of victory must preponderate in favor of the zeal and resolution of our soldiers, and the sacrifices of our citizens. History exhibits no example of a united nation striving to obtain one great object, being deceived in its hopes. Did not our enemies nineteen years ago, loose their capital—and notwithstanding, was not their nationality and independence secured? Never let us forget that we owe every thing to our country—our common mother.—Her existence is ours—we wear her chains. Then let us once more renew in our hearts the already sworn oath, that we resolve to be a free people—that we will not lay down the sword of our fathers until we recover liberty and independence.—Henceforth let our motto be "Death or victory!" And when we shall stand in order of battle, we will meet the enemy with the cry, Live the country! and thus will we conquer. ROZISKY

The Messenger of Chambers of Sept. 28, affirms that the first acts of the Russian authorities at Warsaw, have not been characterized by that rigour and vengeance which we at first feared would be the case. But it is added in order to form a correct judgment of the clemency of Nicholas, we must wait till the fate of the Polish army shall have been decided upon, to know if the amnesty will not include conditions calling upon all the citizens to deposit in the arsenal all the arms in their possession which belong to the Crown. All persons having arms belonging to themselves, are all to retain them, provided they form part of the National Guards. The third Proclamation is from Baron Korff, announcing that the officers belong to the Polish army may remain in Warsaw provided that within twenty-four hours they present themselves at his office, and deposit a declaration that they will never again bear arms against the Russian troops, all who neglect to do this will be considered and treated as prisoners of war. The fourth is by General Count Witt, giving notice that all officers and persons attached to the Polish army intending to quit the capital, must leave it by two o'clock in the afternoon of the 10th, and cross the Vistula; or, in default, they would be considered as prisoners of war. The fifth and last, is from the President of the Municipality, by order of the Commandant, enjoining all functionaries, and other persons employed in the administration of the hospitals, as well as all the functionaries and other persons employed in the municipality of Warsaw, to continue to exercise their several functions under the penalty of being tried by a court martial.

The Hamburg Correspondent contains the following letter, dated Berlin, Sept. 20. Yesterday M. de Seidlitz, Aid-de-camp to the Prussian Colonel Count Kautz, who attends the Russian Head Quarters, arrived here with most tranquilizing accounts from Warsaw. Several divisions of the Polish army, however, refuse to comply with the capitulation. It is therefore probable that the Russians will be obliged to carry on, for a time, a petty warfare in some of the palatinates.

Greece.—The following, from a London paper, is another version of the affair in which the Greek fleet was destroyed. *Napoli di Romani*, Aug. 17.—Affairs here still partake of an unsettled and transient character. The Apdroids have acted against Capo d'Istria, he having given them great offence by, it was understood, selling the Helas Greek frigate, lying at Poros Harbour, to the Russian Government. The moment this report reached Hydra, old Admiral Miaulis proceeded to Poros with 700 men, and boarded the Helas, which was guarded only by about 8 or 10 Russians, completely rigged her in seven days, with sails bent and ready for sea; he then sent 100 men on board of a Corvette, mounting 26 guns, and 100 men each on board two steamers. One of the latter he placed as a guard to a narrow passage, to prevent the troops of Capo d'Istria from passing and attacking the town, Capo d'Istria aware of the determined conduct of the old Admiral, with a Russian frigate and two brigs blocked the port, and prevented the Helas from putting to sea.—The Greek seeing his plan thus frustrated, sent all his crew back to Hydra, and told the Russian Admiral that if he attempted to fire at the Helas, or any other ship in the harbor, he would blow them all up. The Russian Admiral treated this as an idle threat but the next day, while they were at prayers, the corvette blew up, and before the Russian Admiral had time to get upon deck, the Helas shared a similar fate. Admiral Miaulis managed to make his escape back to Hydra, but very nearly lost his life in the attempt. The Russians lost 6 killed, and had 23 wounded. Half the town is burned down, and the harbour is covered with the floating wreck. The French Admiral Ri-

cord has threatened an attack upon Hydra since, but I have heard that our ships have orders that if he fire a shot at the town, to sink him." Another correspondent states, that old Miaulis was prompted to destroy the Helas and the other ship because he had understood that Capo d'Istria intended with the squadron to visit the Greek Islands, to compel the payment of taxes and to punish by punishment, fine, imprisonment, and execution, various persons, who were inimical to his despotism. The loss of lives sustained by the Russians was in an action between a fort, which Miaulis had hastily run up, and a sloop of war (Telemaque,) which endeavoured to cut off a provision vessel sent from Hydra with supplies to him, and which vessel succeeded in her object. Capo d'Istria had banished Trecaoussi and Prince Caradja, with several others, for having been concerned in this revolt.

The conferences respecting the boundaries of Greece, and a choice of a Prince for that country, are resumed. The Government of Capo d'Istria give general dissatisfaction, and will lead, as it has already done in particular instances, to much bloodshed and confusion.

From the Boston Daily Advertiser. MADAWASKA.—It would seem from the following paragraph that the Executive Government of Maine now feel the embarrassment in which they are involved, by the improvident measure of incorporating a town within the limits of the territory hitherto under the jurisdiction of the province of Nova Scotia, and sending agents thither to induce the inhabitants to organize the town under that act, in direct violation of the understanding between the British government and ours, that the occupation should remain so long unchanged as the negotiations for the adjustment of the boundary were pending. We do not perceive that there is but one course to be pursued by the government of Maine. This is to indemnify the sufferers under the act, in the best manner they can, and to urge the general government to rescind the measure, unless we be advised see what the Executive of the State can do, unless it is to renew their appeal to the general government, and perhaps make provision for the comfort of the families of the prisoners in case they need assistance.

Mr. Deane, one of the agents of the State who visited the Madawaska settlement during the past summer, arrived in town last night, probably to make report to the Governor and Council.—There are various opinions expressed by the different papers in the State, and by individuals, with respect to the proper course to be pursued. While some think it best to keep cool, and wait the motions of the general government, and the adjustment of the difficulties by negotiation, others, and apparently a large majority, appear to have their patience exhausted, and are for driving the state to assert its own rights and protect its own subjects. They admit that the State has no constitutional authority to invade the British territory, but they suggest that it has the right and the power to exercise the law of relation.

We can make reprisals upon some of His Majesty's liege subjects, and they contend that we should forthwith arrest some of them, say twice as many as there are of our citizens confined at Fredericktown, and imprison them till the Americans are released.

The matter is now in a very perplexing situation, and it is very difficult to decide what course this State ought to pursue. That the general government has been guilty of a gross negligence in relation to the subject seems now to be pretty generally admitted. It is stated in the Argus, we suppose on the authority of Judge Preble, that in January last the British Government officially, but secretly, made known to the King of the Netherlands, its entire satisfaction with his decision, and that for more than six months the government has folded up its arms and preserved an unbroken silence.
