By the arrival of the Tally Ho and Nimrod London papers of the 3rd and 7th, and Liverpoo of the 4th and 9th January have been received. The question upon which so many opinions are divided, with regard to the creation of a nobility sufficiently numerous to save the country from the ruin inevitably suspended over its head by another rejection of the Reform Bill, is at length decided, and the King has resolved to concur in the course which his ministers have suggested, to avert a national convulsion. Upon the policy or prudence of this decisive step, we are unwilling to array our own judgment, (when perhaps the security of the British Constitution is at stake,) with the wisdom of the more experienced. It will become a precedent, no doubt, for the maturity of other projects not yet developed; but certainly connected with the universal principles of Reform. At present the plan appears in its infancy, but on the repeal of the Union, which we have no reason to doubt will follow the success of the present measure, then indeed will be a struggle, one in which self interest alone will be consulted, without any reference to the violent disseveration that must ensue to every thing politically important to the present and future privileges of Ireland. The separation of that island from those twins, with which for the last two and thirty years it has been (fortunately for herself) identified, is pregnant with consequences only intelligible to those intimately informed on the principles by which property is possessed. The confiscated lands of ruined abbeys now forming a material branch of Episcopal emolument may be redeemed. The properties snatched by Cromwell for the payment of his troops, from those who were enemies to the Commonwealth, may not impossibly be restored : for we know that the vigilant eye of Napoleon was fixed upon the accomplishment of these objects, possessing as the Parisian archives do. every original deed; and nothing saved the kingdom from the grasp of the Emperor, but the act which bound the interests of the three great kingdome, in one indivisible alliance.

The Assembly, on Friday morning, plaad £10,000 at the disposal of His Excelforcement of quarantine regulations next summer. The site chosen for that purpose is understood to be Grosse Isle, an Island about thirty-five miles below the port, where there is a good harbor for ships. The islaid will be placed entirely under the militmy, and all the regulations will be onforcal by them. Communications by telegraph cm be received in two or three minutes the telegraphs erected during the last was are still standing, it being only requisite to erect one on the island.

The House of Assembly, in Committee of the whole on Wednesday, on the Report of the standing Committe of Internal Commenications, decided by a vote of 23 to 18, till the work done was visited, and the accounts of the Commissioners settled. The Committee had recommended grants to the amount of between £3000 and £4000, and propositions for further undertakings by means of loans, &c. The whole amount demanded this year was little short of £200,000, or five times the amount of the anaual surplus revenue. With this surplus, former grants have been so large and improvident, that on the 10th of October next are requested to meet at the Court there will be a deficit of cash in the chest, to meet the appropriations, of upwards of £50,000. The only grants this year for internal communications, it is believed, are the bridge over the St. Maurice £6000, and the Ice bridge at Quebec £300. There is, however, a large sum unexpended of the appropriations of former years, which will prevent the entire stoppage of work on the roads, at the public expense, in several parts of the Province .- Montreal Gazette.
