Many of us have heretofore proved our loyalty and attachment to our King and Constitution, in the defence of our country, and, most Gracious Sire, we will, all of us, with equal alacrity, fly to arms (if need be) to repel foreign aggression or suppress domestic insurrection.

That Your Majesty may long continue to reign over us, in the enjoyment of health and unmingled happiness, is the fervent prayer of Your Majesty's subjects—the inhabitants of the District of Johnstown, undersigned.—*Brockville Gazette.*

A meeting was held yesterday at Carleton Place consisting of the inhabitants of Beckwith, Ramsey, and other adjacent townships, which was very numerously attended, and the same address to His Majesty unanimously adopted; the other proceedings being also of a similar description. *Perth Examiner.*

Letters from Liverpool, dated in January, mention that several of the Quebec Traders were to sail earlier than usual. The short passages made last year, the higher homeward freights obtained by early arrivals, as well as the prospect of fair prices for timber in the home markets next spring, have probably led to this step. It appears to us well established, that the gulf is free from ice during the whole of the winter, and that the ice which encumbers it is seldom detached from the Newfoundland and Labrador coast before the middle of April. Vessels arriving in the gulf before that period would always find a free passage. The port of Quebec is open for vessels in nine years out of ten, between the 8th and 19th April, and its navigation is interrupted for three or four days after by the descent of the Lake ice between the 19th and 24th. In nine years out of ten, therefore vessels may very safely arrive at Quebec subsequent to the 8th April, after which period, no new ice is formed sufficient to interrupt the navigation.—*O. Q. Gaz.*

We observe by the Halifax Royal Gazette, that the Bill imposing, as regards Nova Scotia, a similar Tax to that to be levied on Emigrants arriving at Quebec, after passing both Houses received the Royal Sanction on the 21st ultimo.—*Wilson's Gazette.*

1. Resolved, That the daily increasing population and importance of this Province imperiously require more open and general markets for facilitating the sale and purchase of merchandise, and agricultural stock and produce, than are at present established.—*Carried.*

Moved by Henry Smith, Esq., seconded by W. H. Gray, Esq.:

2. Resolved, That in the United Kingdom and other old countries of Europe, the constitution of Fairs has proved most effectually conducive to the furtherance of the desirable objects referred to in the foregoing resolution, and has uniformly augmented the trade and prosperity of all cities, towns, and villages in which they are held, and that similar institutions in the various towns and villages of this Province would be productive of the same beneficial results.—*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. A. J. Ferns, and seconded by Mr. Mackenzie:

3. Resolved, That from the central situation of Kingston, with reference to the other parts of the Province, and its other local advantages, the establishment of Fairs for the sale of goods, wares, and merchandise, live stock, and other agricultural produce of every description, would not only tend in an especial manner to promote the trade and prosperity of the town, but also prove an incalculable convenience and advantage to the commercial and agricultural interests of the whole Province of Upper Canada.—*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. Webster, seconded by Mr. Davy:

4. Resolved, That a petition from the Inhabitants of Kingston, embodying the previous resolutions, be presented to His Excellency Sir John Colborne, our Lieutenant Governor, praying that he would, by virtue of the Royal Prerogative which he is invested as the representative of our gracious Sovereign, bestow upon the town a grant of the privilege of holding Fairs in every year; each to continue on such days, and of the amount of such periods, as the committee of the Inhabitants to be appointed for that purpose, shall deem requisite.—*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. Binley, seconded by Mr. Drummond:

5. Resolved, That a committee of three and a Secretary, be appointed for the purpose of preparing the petition to His Excellency, and for managing and conducting all matters necessary and expedient to the objects of this meeting; and that Messrs. Smith, Gray, and Dalton, be said Committee, and Mr. Dawe the Secretary.—*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. Manahan, seconded by Mr. Greaves:

6. Resolved, That these Resolutions be published in the Patriot, Chronicle, and Herald newspapers.—*Carried.*

THE KINGSTON CHRONICLE.

SATURDAY, MARCH 24, 1832.

We have no later intelligence from Europe than that of which we gave a short summary in our postscript of Saturday last, and of which we have given to day such extracts as our very limited space for foreign politics would admit. The opinions on the subject of British Reform continue as diversified and unsatisfactory as ever. There does not appear the same feverish anxiety for the result as marked its slow and tedious progress last session. Nevertheless, the friends of the measure are sanguine in the prospect of ultimate success, even without the adoption of that proposal of making Peers of sufficient quantity to secure its reception in the Upper House.

A ridiculous and awkward attempt at a conspiracy to overthrow the Bourbon dynasty was discovered in time to allow the King of the French a longer but more precarious hold of his present unenviable possession.

The determined and sanguinary opposition to the tythe system has been recently marked by an atrocity of the most barbarous character in the murder of the Ven. Archdeacon Whitty, in the noon day, by a mob, who actually stoned their victim to death. We have given such particulars of this atrocity as have reached us. They require no comment, but mark the horrid brutality of the lower orders, whom no concessions can conciliate; and who are unawed by the repeated examples of legal violation which every commission and assize render it necessary to make, to secure the peace and tranquility of that ill-fated portion of the British Empire.

The Scotch reform bill was brought in and read a first time. It would appear that the Irish and Scotch anti-reformers intend to combine with the Irish reformers in opposing the bill for Ireland.

A numerous meeting assembled here on Thursday, in compliance with a requisition to the Sheriff, in order to memorial His Excellency for the privilege of holding fairs in this town. Several resolutions (which we have inserted to-day) were passed, and a committee appointed to draft the address. The Chair was addressed by Mr. Dawe in a most appropriate speech, in which he warmly and powerfully advocated the establishment of Fairs, and suggested some excellent plans for their future organization.

We would draw the attention of our readers to the several communications published in this day's paper upon subjects vitally connected with the welfare of the Province. The imposition of a poll tax upon the distressed emigrants who fly to this country for an asylum from the miseries of the over populated portions of the United Kingdom is unjust, illiberal, and uncharitable; and we call upon the inhabitants of Kingston instantly to meet and forward such a remonstrance to His Majesty as may induce him to withhold the royal assent from such an iniquitous law.

We are told that a sale of 1000 barrels of Rochester Flour, of Beach & Co's. best red brand superfine, has been made to Mr. John Counter of this town, at \$4.62; deliverable in Kingston at the opening of the Navigation.

We have given the loyal address of the inhabitants of Brockville to His Majesty, and regret that we have no space for their excellent Resolutions. We rejoice to see so many and powerful demonstrations of Canadian loyalty and contentment proceeding from such respectable quarters.

We attended on Thursday the display of loyalty which the counties of Lenox and Addington presented on that day at Bath, in pursuance of public notice. Allan Macpherson, Esq. was in the chair. The resolutions, which we are unable to publish to-day, amounted to seven in number, and from these the address to His Majesty was drafted—which follows. It was read and adopted amidst the most deafening acclamation.

Mr. Perry attended, and asked the Chairman for permission to make motions, or add amendments to those that might be produced. Every facility was afforded him. One amendment was proposed, and upon a division was rejected, three to one. He subsequently moved a resolution on the subject of the settlement duties upon the lands of U. E. Loyalists; that they were unjust, and requiring to be abolished. This also experienced the same fate as the last. Mr. Perry evidently discovered the futility of any opposition, and was more an object of commiseration to the assembled crowd than of any other feeling. He was unsupported by a single individual. The fabric of his popularity tottered in every expression he used, and it was with difficulty the Chairman could procure him an audience. He retired a monument of disappointed ambition!

The meeting was opened by a manly and spirited speech from Samuel Casey, Esq., and was addressed, in reply to Mr. Perry's observations, by the indefatigable friend of Lenox and Addington, Geo. Mackenzie, Esq. He completely removed, as the issue testified, any attempted innovation upon the proceedings of the day by Mr. Perry, and was loudly and enthusiastically cheered by the assemblage, which consisted of about 400 of the yeomen of these counties.

The motion approving of Sir John Colborne's administration was carried by shouts of applause, and before we left Bath, near 300 names had been added to the address to His Majesty.

Thus have Lenox and Addington redeemed their reputation, and given a public and lasting testimony, that in loyalty and attachment to the Crown, and its Representative in this Province, they are not to be eclipsed by any other portion of His Majesty's subjects.

At 4 o'clock, about thirty gentlemen sat down to an excellent dinner, prepared in Mr. Davy's best style; and had Mr. Perry but heard the toast, the speeches, the harmony of sentiment which prevailed, he would no doubt be the first to read his recantation, and become a steady and staunch friend to the noble people that assembled upon that occasion. We have heard it hinted that that day is likely to be commemorated by an annual public dinner. It happened on the Equinox, and as that event produces a change in our seasons, hopes are entertained that it may be the period from which Mr. Perry's conversion to a rational being, from an infatuated but disappointed democrat, may be registered.

TO THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

Most Gracious Sovereign:—We, the undersigned, inhabitants of the united counties of Lenox and Addington, in Your Majesty's province of Upper Canada, deem it necessary, under present circumstances, to address Your Majesty; and lay at the foot of Your Majesty's throne, this humble testimony of our faithful and devoted attachment to Your Majesty's sacred person and government.

We humbly trust that the relations which subsist between Great Britain and Upper Canada, will be long continued; for we are deeply and gratefully impressed with a sense of the great benefits which we derive from our connection with the parent state.

Under the constitution granted to us in 1791, by Your Majesty's Father of glorious memory, we have enjoyed, and do continue to enjoy, as great a degree of prosperity and happiness as any people, under any form of government, which we have any knowledge of; and in consequence of the protection which we receive from Great Britain, we are required to make fewer sacrifices in return for those blessings than any other people, except those who have the happiness to live, like us, beneath Your Majesty's paternal sway in British North America.

We therefore humbly beg to assure Your Majesty that we are not only opposed to any change in our present constitution; but that we sincerely regret the attempts which have been made to impede Your Majesty with the belief that we are desirous of a departure from its principles.

We are convinced by past experience of the readiness of the Imperial Government to remove and remedy, as far as possible, every just cause of complaint; and we are satisfied that any change which may be required by us, or the removal of any real grievance which may be found to exist, can be effected by the local Legislature, through our own representatives; to whom the privilege has been granted to assist in making laws for our peace and good government.

Feeling, in common with all good subjects, that Your Majesty's approbation is the highest reward which a servant of the Crown can aspire to; and being aware that a faithful and honest discharge of duty is the surest road to Your Majesty's Royal favour; we feel ourselves called upon to assure Your Majesty, that we approve of the administration of the government of this Province by His Excellency Sir John Colborne; and that his Excellency's zeal to promote our prosperity and happiness entitles him to our grateful thanks.

Satisfied with our lot; sensible of the many benefits which result from our connection with Great Britain; feeling confident of Your Majesty's gracious disposition to perpetuate the enjoyment of them not only to us, but to our posterity; we, as dutiful and loyal subjects, humbly and fervently pray to Almighty God, that Your Majesty may long continue to reign in peace and happiness over a united and prosperous Empire.
